Out on his own

VERNON SMALL had Hong Kong on his mind as he won the 89th New Zealand championship, organised by the North Shore club over the Christmas-New Year holiday period. It was Small's third successive title, but the first time he had come first alone.

Small, a 27-year-old Christchurch student who is putting the finishing touches to a PhD thesis in English literature, played in solid, classical style, scoring three of his four wins in well-executed endgames. He said afterwards that he had probably played altogether too solidly, as he had at first been regarding the championship as training for the Asian zonal championship in Hong Kong this month. Small and Murray Chandler are representing New Zealand in the zonal, a stage in the elimination series to choose a challenger for the world championship. "I was not playing sharply enough to get winning chances with Black," Small said.

Half a point behind Small came Aucklander Ortvin Sarapu, not quite managing his 19th championship, and Dunedin student Tony Dowden. Dowden, in his first championship, enjoyed a certain amount of good fortune during the tournament, but also displayed considerable tenacity and resourcefulness.

Wellington schoolboy Jonathon Sarfati, also in his first championship, surprised everyone including himself by playing with great solidity, losing only one game and finishing fourth equal, a further half a point back. Equal with him was Aucklander Bruce Watson, who scored five wins, more than anyone else. Watson in round three put his queen en prise to Dowden when a pawn up in a time scramble, but suffered with remarkable equanimity and did not let the shock affect his play in the rest of the tournament.

Vivian Burndred won her first women's championship, a point clear of Winsome Stretch. The top-rated woman player, Fenella Foster, chose to play in the premier reserve championship in order to get more experience against strong players. She scored six points out of 11 in the reserve championship, which was won jointly by David Gollogly and myself with 81/2 points.
