
Question 3. By what score did the USSR beat the Rest of the World in their London match last year?: (a) 21½-19½, (b) 21-19, (c) 20½-19½.


Question 4. Former New Zealand Women's Champion Fenella Foster, pictured here, began her career in the same small home town as this writer. Which town?
