## TAL WINS CANDIDATES＇TOURNAMENT



Mikhail Tal，22－year－old Latvian grandmaster，has won the right to challenge M．M．Botvinnik next year for the world chess titie．

Tal，champion of U．S．S．R．in 1957 and 1958，winner of the Portoroz interzonal last year，and winner of the Zurich international tourna－ ment a few months ago，added to his already illustrious record by winning the 1959 Candidates Tournament，played in Yugoslavia from early September to October 30．Tal took the lead in the sixteenth round and thereafter was not headed．In a tremendous burst of scor－ ing in the middle of the tournament Tal conceded only three draws in 13 successive games，winning the rest．After 23 rounds Tal（17⿺辶 led by $2 \frac{1}{2}$ points from his nearest rival，P．Keres．

The two leaders met in round 24 and Keres won in 79 moves．Tal
tried to play surely and Keres won a Pawn which he returned for a
Kingside attack．Soon after the adjournment Keres won two Pawns and In a difficult endgame with Queen and Knight each Keres played with great precision．

This left Keres with a chance of catching the leader，and at the start of the final round Tal＇s lead had been reduced to one point． However，Tal drew his final game，with Benko，while Keres lost to Olafsson．
OUT OF FORM Keres scored 3－1 against Tal，and the winner ${ }^{\text {s }}$ only $==\pi==\pi====$ other loss was in his very first game，to Smyslov．A preliminary examination of the results shows this to have been Smyslov＇s only win with the White pieces in the entire tournament His other eight wins were all with Black，and his fourth placing was his lowest ever in a candidates event．The 1957 world champion was badly out of form，especially in the early stages．
Tal played sparkling chess throughout，and the fact that his middle－game brilliance meant a mach smaller proportion of drawn－out endgames than played by the others appears to have helped keep him fresh throughout the 28 －round event．

Petrosian scored too many draws（17 in 28 games）to have a winn－ ing chance，although he was the early leader．

THB NCN－RUSSIANS The tournament was a triumph for the Russians， $================$ who filled the top four places．S．Gligoric，re－ garded as their main challenger，was in the running until the last quarter of the tourney．In the final seven games he scored only two points．

For 16-year-old Bobby Fischer the event was a grand success. Only $1 \frac{1}{2}$ points below 50 per cent in such distinguished company, he must be regarded as a future world title prospect. He could not gain even half a point from Tal, but won twice from Keres.
Olafsson was responsible for one of the most dramatic events of the tournament. In rounds 7 and 8 Petrosian, regarded by many as the hardest player in the world to beat, lost in succession to Glig. oric and Olafsson. In round 15 Olafsson and Petrosian met again, and their game was adjourned. Olafisson won again, and at the end of the game 5000 spectators who had gathered in the square below to watch the game demonstrated, gave Olafsson an ovation and carried him shoulder high. ("GN" will be watching for the game score).

## Dr Reindler Wins Gisborne Open

There was a record entry for the

12 th annual 6-round Labour weekend open tournament run by the Gisborne C.C., competitors coming from as far afield as Dannevirice and Te Awamutu. Play generally was of a high standard and competition was keen throughout, culminating in the final round, when there was a possibility of a triple tie for first place. Dr W. Reindler and R . C. Pickering, both from Te Awamutu, and with $4 \frac{1}{2}$ points each, were drawn to meet on board i, while $J$. Holdsworth ( $3 \frac{1}{2}$ ) and H.J.Toye (4), both Gisborne players, were on board 2 .

Toye won, making him 5. As the other games finished, the crowd gathered around board 1. A powerful attack by Reindler was ably defended, making a draw or even a successful counter-attack a possible outcome. However, Reindler, who had opened with the Polish opening, exerted increasing K-side pressure and eventually won the game and with it the tournament.

Dr Reindler won the Llewellyn Meredith Challenge Cup and miniature. Book trophies were awarded to minor place-getters, down to 6th equal, and R.Ferrot (Hastings) also won the trophy for the best score by a player who had not previously competed in a tournament outside his own club.

The tournament was opened by the club patron, Mr E.E.Somervell, and Miss Grieve served refreshments at each interval.

Trophies were nresented by the club president, Mr F.N.Day. He thanked the $v i s i t o r s$ for their attendance and extended a cordial invitation to them to return.

Messrs M.S.Littlewood (Hastings) and T.Gurney (Napier) reflied and congratulated Gisborne's D.O.P., Mr Meredith, and all who had helped make the event a success.
