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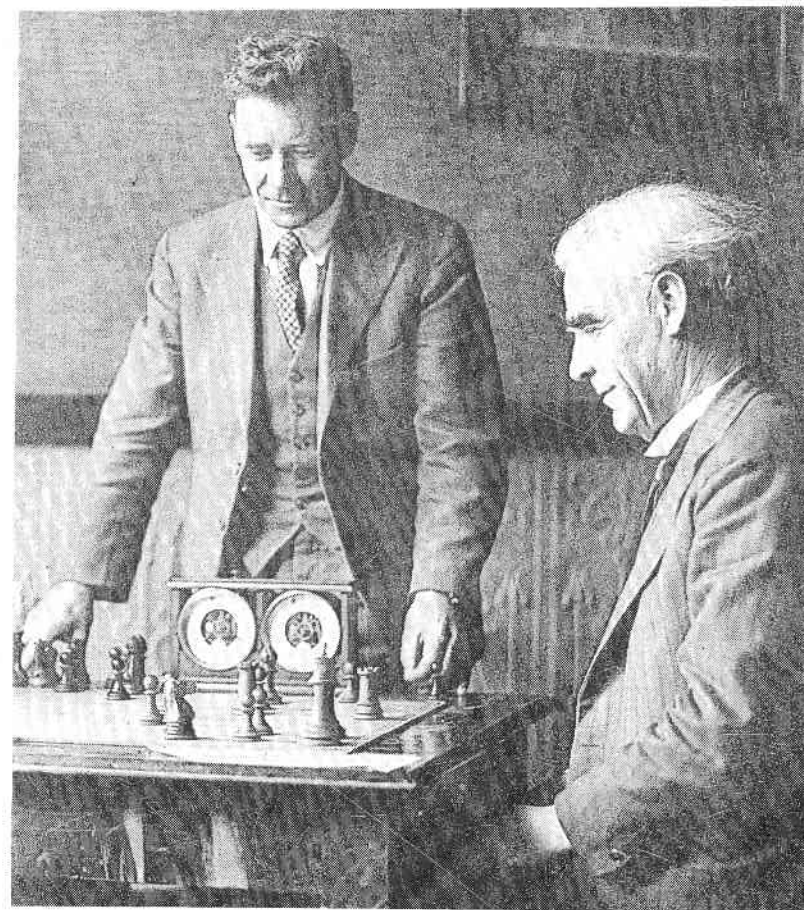

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INSIDE STORY

At the end of January council meeting the president, Bill Poole, welcomed the new members; ie Tim Frost, secretary, Russell Dive, treasurer and a new councillor Rowan Wood, elected to fill an empty place. Glenys Mills had been asked to join council but declined.

A query regarding \$6000 (we thought it was \$4000) allocated to DOP seminars being absorbed into the general accounts was passed to the president. As we recall, it was subsequently stated that the money had to be spent (or seen to be spent) or we would lose it.

At this point we must point out that these reports are done mostly from memory; a memory that is not all that reliable. There have been threats of reports of council doings by others but no action.

Otago has been awarded the Bledisloe Cup for 1989 and there was no contest in 1990.

Last year's Asian Junior did not take place till February this year but the council did not receive notice of it till two days before closing date. The president and secretary attempted, with no success, to arrange an entry.

The new treasurer has been asked to produce some budgets for the association and the magazine to give the council better information on finance.

At the time of writing the World Cup idea is still possible (and is really a very exciting prospect) but if we haven't found a couple of million by Easter it will be flagged away.

The Hall of Fame thing (Ortvin Sarapu) is still in the melting pot. The president is chasing it up.

Martin Dreyer attended the early March meeting when in Wellington and brought along the Bledisloe Cup. Presumably it is now in Otago as the last known winners.

Council received and will pass on certificate and badges for Ben Martin, FM and Bob Gibbons, International Arbitrer.

The Auckland councillor asked the meeting what council intended to do about two people who have said they will boycott chess events. The reply was that individuals have that right and council can not interfere.

Round 11 v Canada (seeded 30th, IM 2130, 2030) 1-2. Smith had good chances after passive play by her opponent but mishandled the attack and lost on time. Metge played perhaps her best game of the Olympiad, sacrificing for an overwhelming attack. McIntosh inexplicably left a piece en prise.

Individual results: Smith 6.5/14 46%; Metge 7.5/14 54%; McIntosh 5.5/12 46%; Mills .5/2 25%.

Overall the result was perhaps as good as expected on paper in terms of points and placing - being slightly lower than last time but, in reality, our women's team significantly improved on past performances. On board 1, Vivian Smith faced 10 rated opponents, including

3 IMs, with an average rating of over 2100. She scored well enough to expect an international rating of 2020. Only mistakes late in some of her games prevented her results being even better.

Katrine Metge also played the toughest field ever faced by a NZ board 2 and has earned a rating of 2065! She was on course for an unprecedented IM norm till mistakes in the last few rounds ruined her chances.

Of the other players, Isabelle McIntosh's play improved in the latter half of the event, mainly due to coach, Lev Aptekar, who worked tirelessly to lift her standard by analysing games and helping Isabelle prepare for each round. As the reserve, Glenys Mills played only 2 games but was a great support to the team. Her sense of humour and unflagging good spirits were invaluable in boosting team morale.

From our experience, two things are clear. Due to the current scarcity of women players in NZ, we can really only do well at an Olympiad if all of our top players are available. Then it would not be unrealistic to expect to finish in the top 15.

It is also clear that our players need a lot more experience at hard competitive play to build up concentration and stamina to last the six-hour Olympiad sessions. Hopefully our players will find the time to study and play lots of chess before the next Olympiad comes around - ~~2000-2000~~ 1992.

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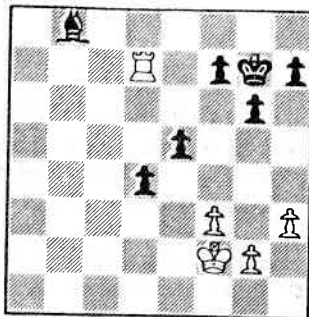

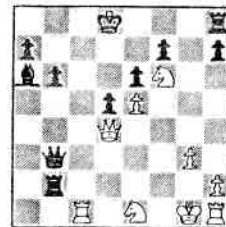

Lembit Oll, from Estonia, carried on his winning form from Adelaide, scoring 8½/9 for a performance rating around 2900.

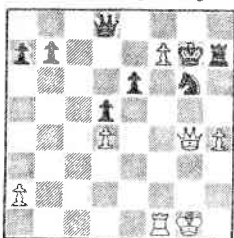

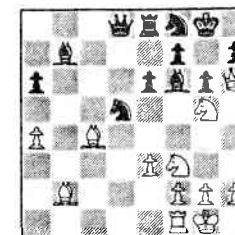

of 14 players would doubtless have seen more blood spilt. The top group was category 16 (2644), the other category 15 (2601). The scores:

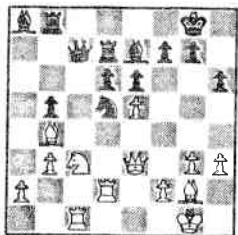

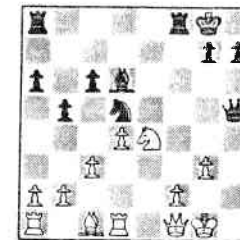
