## Waitakere Licensing Trust NZ Women＇s Championship

Ten players fronted up for the 1998 Waitakere Licensing Trust NZ Women＇s Chess Championship in West Auckland at Easter．While that may not seem many，it was the biggest field since the organisers，Waitemata Chess Club，last held the NZ Women＇s Championship，in 1994.
And most importantly，it included all the active players bidding for a place in this year＇s New Zealand Women＇s Olympiad team．
The tournament boasted a generous prize－ fund－more than $\$ 1800$ ，including $\$ 600$ for the winner－thanks to the sponsorship of the Waitakere Licensing Trust．

Playing conditions were excellent；the games were played in the drama suite at Kelston Girls High School，which provided an arena－like atmosphere，with raised seats for spectators surrounding the playing area． Other features were a daily bulletin for competitors，and free tea，coffee and biscuits．
The pre－tournament favourites were clearly Katrine Metge（Papatoetoe），Viv Smith Waitemata），and the Sheehan sisters，Teres and Rosaleen（Hastings）．

Katrine was the highest rated woman domestically，Viv was not far behind，Teresa was the highest rated internationally，and Rosaleen was the defending national champion．It would have been a huge upset if the winner came from outside this quartet．
An unknown factor，however，was Russian－ born Eleanora Mikhailik．She emigrated to New Zealand five years ago，but this was her first serious tournament since arriving

Making up the field were former New Zealand representatives Edith Otene （Henderson）and Helen Courtney （Hamilton），Wellington＇s Zoe Kingston， Catherine Tan from Palmerston North and Waitemata debutante Huatahi Maunsell．

## Round Two

Metge and Rosaleen Sheehan had a steady draw，while Smith had a lucky escape after Kingston built up a winning position，only to go into a trance and lose on time with five moves to make－Smith had all of six seconds left．Mikhailik won easily after Otene badly misplayed the opening and then overlooked a two－move tactic and Tan gave Maunsell a pawn on move 4 and her king on move 19．The game of the round was Teresa Sheehan＇s win over Courtney．This game， with its pretty finish，won the best game prize for the tournament．

## Round Three

Smith tried out a new opening against Metge and came badly unstuck．However， she put up tough resistance and，after Metge missed a winning exchange sacrifice， managed to draw．Rosaleen Sheehan easily handled Kingston＇s bizarre 1．．．a6．Teresa Sheehan gratefully accepted Maunsell＇s free pawn on move 6 and went on to win．

Mikhailik won when Courtney gave up the centre and then reacted badly to a premature attack．Otene beat Tan，who continued to insist on giving away early pawns．

## Round Four

Rosaleen Sheehan snatched a draw from a pawn down when Smith failed to notice a three－fold repetition．Metge outbooked and easily beat Mikhailik．Teresa Sheehan outplayed Kingston，who surrendered any chance in the ending with a terrible blunder． Otene beat Maunsell despite losing a pawn for nothing in the opening．
The surprise of the round was Courtney＇s loss to Tan．Courtney created a bad pawn weakness，lost a pawn，and then worked hard to generate counterplay，only to blunder a rook，probably in time trouble
At this stage four players were tied for the lead on $3 / 4$－Smith，Metge and the two Sheehans．Metge looked to have the easier run home，as she had played the other three， while Smith and Rosaleen Sheehan still had to meet Teresa．But things don＇t always go according to the script．

## Round Five

This was a crucial round．Teresa was playing Vivian，while the other leaders met lesser opposition．After much pre－game agonising，Smith played what looked like a fairly solid，unambitious opening against her tactical opponent．However she gave the game a sharp turn on move 8 and pushed through with a king－side attack to score an important point．Meanwhile the unthinkable happened－Metge unexpectedly lost to Otene in the upset of the tournament． Rosaleen Sheehan almost suffered the same fate，being outplayed by Courtney，who reached a won ending only to stare transfixed at the clock as it counted down her last ten seconds with a move still to make．

In the other games，Kingston accepted Maunsell＇s unintentional gifts，while Tan waited until move 13 to give away a pawn to Mikhailik．
So the leaders were reduced to two：Smith and Rosaleen Sheehan had 4／5，followed by Metge，Teresa Sheehan，Mikhailik and Otene on 3.

## Round Six

Another big match－up：Rosaleen Sheehan had white against Teresa．But there was no love lost here．Teresa went on to outplay her sister and score a good win．Smith meanwhile struggled for hours to eventually beat Mikhailik in a bishop and pawn ending Maunsell gifted Metge a piece on move 15 Courtney played one of her best games to beat Otene，and Kingston somehow won against Tan from a pawn down in an ending．
With one round left the dust had cleared， leaving Smith in the comforting position of being a point clear and assured of at least
first equal．The fight for second was between Metge and the Sheehan sisters．

## Round Seven

Smith，keen on a draw against Courtney， chose a balanced and fairly sterile line，but then forgot to offer an early draw．While Courtney was wondering why she hadn＇t， Smith made what could have been a fatal error in an otherwise totally drawn position．． Fortunately（for Smith）Courtney didn＇t spot the mistake，instead making an innocuous move and offering a draw，which was quickly accepted．
The other games were all one－sided．Metge easily won after Kingston played the opening woefully and got checkmated on
move 11．Rosaleen Sheehan also had an easy win when Otene blundered a piece on move 10．Tan only gave a pawn on move 12 against Teresa Sheehan，but followed up with a rook on move 20 ．Mikhailik was too strong for Maunsell，who knew nothing about the opening．

## Fifth title

So the NZ Women＇s Chess Champion－for the fifth time－is Vivian Smith．She had her share of good fortune during the tournament， but also played some good chess and was steadier overall than her rivals．
Of the joint runners－up，Katrine Metge did everything expected of her－until her shock loss to Otene．This game cost Katrine the title．

Rosaleen Sheehan played solid chess throughout，and won the games she was supposed to．Her loss to Teresa cost her the title．
Teresa Sheehan played some of the best chess and was the most decisive player， winning five games and losing two（to Metge and Smith），with no draws．
In fifth place was Eleanora Mikhailik，who played better as the tournament progressed． She finished ahead of established players like Otene and Courtney，who had disappointing results．

Overall，the toumament was successful－ although，as always，the organising club would have liked a bigger turnout．All the players took home some prize－money，as organisers Waitemata added a $\$ 5$ prize for each win scored．
Thus Smith earned $\$ 620$ ，while the three runners－up won over $\$ 300$ each，with Teresa getting the most because of her five wins and her extra $\$ 50$ for the best game．Fifth place－getter Mikhailik was the other major winner，with $\$ 120$ ．

## 1998 Asian Cities Tournament

The 1998 Asian Cities Tournament was hosted by the Malaysian Chess Federation in the Genting Highlands over Easter．We received the invitation barely in time but were able to arrange an Auckland team comprising Hilton Bennett，Paul Spiller，Bob Gibbons，Peter Goffin and Barbara Mckinney．Barbara was the team doctor and emergency reserve．

Paul Spiller managed to arrange an excellent deal on the airfares，which included five nights free accomodation in Kuala Lumpur．Everyone except Peter was able to take advantage of that and it gave us an enjoyable break plus the time to acclimatise and prepare ourselves．Peter flew in the night before the event started and did not arrive until 4am which didn＇t help his chess at all．

We were expecting to be somewhat outclassed，as this event has continued to grow in strength and it has been 13 years since Auckland last competed．When we arrived at the Awana Hotel the night before the tournament started we were seeded 22nd out of 26 teams and only reached that dizzy height as a result of Peter＇s 1985 Elo rating．

## No problems or disputes

The toumament venue，food and accommodation were excellent and full credit is due to the organisers for their forethought and preparation．In particular Hamid Majid did a wonderful job of the general organisation while the chief arbiter Ibrahim Yaacob and the International Arbiter corps ensured that there were no problems or disputes．The competitors and officials were drawn from the full range of Asian and Middle Eastern countries and it was a very multicultural gathering．
Last year＇s winners Tashkent brought what was in effect the Uzbekistan national team complete with a cameraman who filmed
virtually everything that occurred in th event．
There was a little juggling of the Auckland board order prior to the competition and we eventually decided to play Hilton ahead of Paul．Everyone was a little nervous about the strength of the opposition and hoping to score at least a couple of points．Of particular concern to us was the rather unusual time control of twenty moves in the first hour then one hour to finish the game． Quite a few of the games were to be heavily influenced by running out of time at the start of the middlegame！

## Round One

Round one saw Auckland pitted against the tenth－seeded Abu Dhabi．Three of the games were miniatures，with Hilton drawing on board one with a Budapest gambit，Paul winning a nicely played Bird＇s opening on board two while Peter lost the white side of a Pirc on board four．I had a somewhat longer game but eventually won on board three in a queen＇s gambit when my opponent overpressed．Our 2．5－1．5 win was the only upset of the first round．For us it was an important confidence booster．

## Round Nine

We were determined to make round nine count and happily we did by defeating Macau 4－0．Hilton＇s orang－utan opening bamboozled his opponent and Paul＇s Budapest proved deadly with a nice sacrificial attack．Peter＇s opponent mesmerised himself and lost on time on move 17 and I had finally leamt how to play Asian chess－get a small advantage and do as little as possible with it until your opponent kills himself in the time pressure！

This was also the crunch time for the Tournament leaders．Tashkent had finally
drawn level with Shijiazhuang at the end of round eight，both teams being on 25.5 with Palembang on 24．Once again the Uzbekis stumbled，drawing 2－2 with Padang and allowing Palembang to catch them by defeating Beirut 3．5－0．5．meanwhile Shijiazhuang defeated Chromepet 3．5－0．5 to take the Dubai Cup．

[^1] NZ Chess

The twenty-first edition of the country's biggest, strongest and richest weekender was held at the Lincoln Green Motor Hotel in Henderson on May 2 and 3.

The tournament was one of the strongest yet. With six current or former New Zealand Champions and 11 players rated over 2000, it was tougher than the most recent New Zealand Championships.

Top seed on rating was Paul Garbett (2319). From Wellington came FM Anthony Ker (2299), IM Russell Dive (2291) and Stephen Lukey (2196). Other major contenders included NZ Champion and defending Waitakere Trust Open Champion Alexei Kulashko (2276), weekend swiss specialist Leonard McLaren (2165), Olympiad team member Scott Wastney (2123) and FM Bob Smith (2226), although the latter's duties as toumament organiser and publicity officer were a slight handicap.
These players, and other ' A ' tournament hopefuls, were competing for prizes totalling $\$ 1750$, including first prize of $\$ 600$.
Players in the separate B and C tournaments also had plenty to play for, with a first prize in the B grade (under 1750 ) of $\$ 300$ and a top prize in the C grade (under 1400) of $\$ 200$.
The total prize-fund of over $\$ 3200$ was by far the largest of any tournament in the country bar Congress, and almost twice the amount offered at this year's North Island Championship.
The prizes, perfect playing conditions and the chance to play some tough games attracted 78 players - close to a record since Waitemata Chess Club began running the event back in 1977.

## Round by round

Round One immediately showed there would be no easy games in the ' A ' tournament. The first casualty was Lukey,
who underestimated Bob Gibbons (1873) and paid the price. Also starting hesitantly were Garbett, who drew with Steadman (1997), McLaren, who could only draw with Latimer (1834) and Finnish visitor A. Satonen, who drew with Perry (1867).
Round Two featured the biggest upset of the toumament. Kulashko turned down a draw offer with a knight against Stuart's three pawns, but then misplayed the ending in a time scramble and lost. In other leading games Ker drew with Wastney, Dive beat Sarapu in a clash of the IM's, and Smith defeated first round giant-killer Gibbons. After just two rounds only three players were on perfect scores: Dive, Smith and Stuart.

In Round Three the leaders all drew. Stuart fended off Garbett, while Smith survived several hours of torture in an inferior ending to earn the half point against Dive. Ker and McLaren drew, as did Satonen and Wastney. Sarapu surprisingly lost to Beach, perhaps partly due to his exertions of the previous round against Dive. Leading scores: Dive, Smith, Stuart 2.5; Garbett, Ker, Kulashko, Lukey, Satonen, McLaren, Wastney, Beach 2.
Round Four produced another stunning upset, again involving Stuart. Dive made the same mistake as Kulashko, tuming down Stuart's draw offer and then overpressing and losing. This made Stuart the sole leader, as Smith took a draw against Ker in a probably winning position under clock pressure. Garbett moved up to second equal with a win over Satonen, as did Kulashko, who beat Wastney, and McLaren, who defeated Lukey. Sarapu suffered another unexpected reversal, losing to Latimer.
In Round Five Stuart had the white pieces against Smith, needing only a draw to finish at least first equal. Smith needed a win to tie for first. Stuart duly offered a draw, which
was rejected．Smith gained a clear advantage in the ensuing play，but then frittered it all away，perhaps distracted by organising registration cards and drinks tickets for the end of toumament function while playing． The game was eventually drawn．
This gave several players a chance to catch Stuart and tie for first．Kulashko duly did this，beating Garbett in a tough game when Paul erred in a drawn position．McLaren also reached four when Dive turned down his draw offer and went for broke．This only succeeded in giving Leonard the full point． In the other key game，Ker beat Latimer to reach 3.5 and tie for fourth with Smith．

## President＇s triumph

So the 21st Waitakere Trust Open produced one of the most unexpected winners in years． Peter Stuart was ranked only 11th out of the 22 entrants，but beat the 3rd and 4th seeds and drew with the first and fifth seeds．It was a great result－and perhaps presages a chess renaissance from the NZCF President？Of the other winners，Kulashko recovered well from his second round upset，showing his customary fighting spirit．McLaren began the tournament slowly with a draw，but won the games that counted in the later rounds， his key win being his last round victory over the over－optimistic Dive．
In fourth place，Ker played steadily to take some money back to Wellington，but was perhaps hoping for half a point more．Smith was happy to be among the prizes and be undefeated，bearing in mind the difficulties of playing and organising．
The grade prizes went to Michael Steadman and Geoffrey Gill，who both scored $3 / 5$ ． Gill＇s effort is especially worthy of note； with a rating of 1707 he originally entered the B Tournament，but agreed to step up to the $\mathbf{A}$ to even up the numbers．

## B grade

Heading the B tournament，on paper，were Robert Davies（1706），Philip Hair（1689） and Prashant Mistry（1686）．Other threats
were New Zealand Women＇s Champion Viv Smith（1676），improving junior Alan Dunn （1668）and Mark Henderson（1614）．The fast improving Igor Bjelobrk（1584）could also not be overlooked．
In the event，Davies，Hair and Smith were never really in the running．Dunn gave his rivals a half point head start by taking a bye in round one because of exams．Mistry， meanwhile，was making no race of the tournament，beating Henderson in round four and looking like picking up the $\$ 50$ bonus for five wins．But the he came badly unstuck against Dunn，losing a miniature and dropping back to second equal with Henderson and Bjelobrk，who came through the ranks after an upset loss to Murray Stewart（1444）in round three．

## C grade

The C tournament was headed by experienced players John Kerry（1387）and Graeme Pocock（1380）．Others who might threaten included Mark Le Brocq（1338）， Ukrainian couple Viktor Portougal and Eleanora Mikhailik，Chinese 8 －year－old prodigy Pu Chen Wang and the country＇s second best 12 －year－old，Colm Hartigan．
As in the B tournament，the top players stumbled early．Portougal，Le Brocq and Hartigan took up the running，all three winning their first three games．Portougal then went down to Hartigan in round four， while Le Brocq beat the unrated Roy Harish （Waitemata）who had also surprisingly won his first three games．The tournament thus came down to a shoot－out between Hartigan and Le Brocq．Hartigan＇s recent opening study paid dividends as he comfortably dispatched Le Brocq to record the only picket fence of the event，winning a $\$ 30$ bonus in the process．

Le Brocq was joined in second place by Portougal，who beat Courtney，and his wife Mikhailik，who lost only one game－to her husband in round two！

After play ended，Ross Dallow，chairman of the Waitakere Licensing Trust，the sponsors，presented the prizes．These included additional awards for the best junior－shared by Dunn and Hartigan－and for the best female－won by Eleanora Mikhailik．All participants and officials were then invited to enjoy free drinks and snacks．

## Overseas news

## New York

The New York Open in March saw 194 players，including 65 GM＇s and 40 IM＇s， battling over nine rounds for a first prize of US $\$ 14,000$ ．Unusually for such big Swisses there was only one winner and that rather a surprise．Armenian GM Artashes Minasian， with a modest 2570 rating，scored $8 / 9$ and collected a bonus of US $\$ 1000$ for his undivided first place．Fellow Armenian GM Smbat Lputyan was the only player on $71 / 2$ points and collected US $\$ 7000$ and this was not the end of the Armenian success as GM Vladimir Akopian shared third on 7 with Russia＇s Vladimir Epishin．

Among the better known names on $61 / 2$ were GMs Bareev（RUS），Kiril Georgiev （BUL），Granda Zuniga（PER），Mikhail Gurevich（BEL）and Smirin（ISR）．Tying for 18th place on 6 were GMs Atalik（TUR）， Chernin（HUN），Ehlvest（EST），Nenashev （UZB）and Tiviakov（RUS）while those on $51 / 2$ included GMs Benjamin（USA），Gulko （USA），Khalifman（RUS），Rogers（AUS） and Spraggett（CAN）．

## Bled

A strong Open in March was won by Russian GM Evgeny Sveshnikov with 7／9． Four shared second place with $61 / 2$ points：IM Delchey（BUL），GM Kozul（CRO），GM Romanishin（UKR）and GM Sermek（SLO）．

## Reykjavik

The first leg of the Nordic Grand Prix saw American GM＇s take the top two places． Larry Christiansen scored $71 / 2$ in the $9-r o u n d$ Swiss to edge out Nick De Firmian 7．GM Curt Hansen（DEN）was third on $61 / 2$ ．Among those sharing fourth on 6 were GMs Stefan Kindermann（GER）and Ivan Sokolov（BIH）．

## Monaco

The 7th Melodie Amber toumament followed its usual pattern of a double round－ robin where each player has one rapid game （ 25 minutes per player with 10 seconds added after each move played）and one blindfold rapid game（similar time control but with 20 seconds added after each move）．
Vladimir Kramnik started with two $11 / 2-1 / 2$ and two $2-0$ victories to enjoy a $21 / 2$ point lead after just four of the eleven rounds．This he maintained for two more rounds when a Kramnik victory looked reasonably assured． Even a $1 / 2-11 / 2$ loss to Vassily Ivanchuk in round 7 left him still $11 / 2$ points ahead of Alexei Shirov with Ivanchuk and Veselin Topalov another half - point behind．Round 8 ， however，ensured there would be an exciting finish as Anatoly Karpov，from back in the pack，beat the leader $11 / 2-1 / 2$ to allow Shirov to catch up and Ivanchuk to come within half a point．
Kramnik＇s 2－0 versus Ljubomir Ljubojevic propelled him back to a full point lead but Shirov＇s $31 / 2 / 4$ finish enabled him to once again gain a share of the lead when it counted most．Ivanchuk came in a close third．

## Dresden
