## Oceania Zonal，Auckland，May 2000

By NM Peter Stuart（Chief Arbiter and NZCF President）

One drawback of the Zonal split is that Aus－ tralia and New Zealand are faced with organising a zonal tournament each year and we will have to be prepared to do it every second or third year． Funding is probably harder to find in New Zealand than in Australia but then the main prizes in these tournaments are IM titles and the one place in the World Championship where defeat in the first round is still quite lucrative．So we did not need a big prize fund for this year＇s event．Indeed，it was run on a shoestring budget with the Auckland Chess Centre offering the use of its rooms for a very modest rental and two of the three free place holders from overseas being billetted．Entry was not cheap for the other play－ ers－$\$ 400$ regardless of rating or title
Most of the credit for the organisation belongs to Michael Freeman who，with his twin hats as NZCF Councillor and＂FIDE dignitary＂，was ideally placed．In consultation with Zone presi－ dent Graham Gardiner（Australia）the Council decided on a nine－round Swiss with a（FIDE rating limit of 2100 ．In fact one player，Ilija llic of Australia，was admitted with a rating of 2096； after his performance in Auckland，however，he will need to do some remedial work on his rating to gain entry in the future！
With a nine round Swiss it looked as though we might have enormous pairing problems due to the（lack of）size of the field．Early in the plan－ ning stage we were fairly confident of a strong Australian presence but gradually it became clear that this would not be the case．
There were four free places，two from Australia and one each from Fiji and New Zealand．Alex Wohl was one of the two original Australian selections but the ACF had a major problem finding the second，eventually settling on 13－ year old Zhao Zong Yuan who had already en－ tered as a fee（ $\$ 400$ ）paying competitor．Fortu－ nately there was a good entry from New Zealand＇s top players with practically everyone with a realistic chance of gaining an IM title in the field and we finished up with 14 players， rather borderline for nine rounds but at least feasible．

Looking at the scedings it appeared that only Alex Wohl would be likely to challenge the top New Zealanders．Indeed，the comparatively weak field（i．e．weak compared to what it could have been if the top Aussies had turned up）gave very good chances for IM titles．
Of the top six seeds，those rated 2300 or higher，only Wohl and Anthony Ker played con－ sistently well throughout but the latter had too many draws to mount a realistic challenge．Thus Wohl was able to dominate the tournament quite convincingly，his only bad moment coming in round 3 when，with both players in only mild time pressure，he allowed mate in one only for Bruce Watson to not only overlook it but in turn allow mate in one！
Russell Dive soon showed that he was not in his best form，scoring only $11 / 2$ points from his first fout games．New Zealand hopes，however， still looked bright when Alexei Kulashko starled with three wins and Paul Garbett with two．Both players，however，then went into an abrupt decline with Alexei scoring only half a point from his next four games while Paul lost three in a row starting in round three．

Two IM＇s，two FM＇s
Meanwhile，Ker was grinding along undefeated and when he scored his third win in round ten the IM title was almost in the bag．A quick draw in the final round gained him the title while Bruce Watson and Stephen Lukey qualified for FM titles by scoring $50 \%$ or more．
The sensation of the tournament was undoubt－ edly Zhao，who not only gained the IM title at the age of 13 but also came in clear second．Such a result did not look likely when he lost rather miserably to Wohl in the first tound when he was recovering from a cold．It turns out，though，that Alex is one of the few players in Australia who can count the youngster as a good customer． Zhao never lost again and exhibited a maturity beyond his years．

## $23^{\text {rd }}$ Waitakere Licensing Trust Open

The 23 rd annual edition of the Waitakere Li － censing Trust Open once again offered the most prize－money of any weekender in the country $\$ 3600$－and again attracted a large and very strong field．
Seventy－six players fronted up at the Lincoln Green Motor Hotel in Waitakere City on May 6， including the top five players on the active rating list and twelve in all rated over 2000
Among the favourites were NZ Champion Alexei Kulashko，IM Russell Dive and FMs Bob Smith，Paul Garbett and Anthony Ker．
But the list of possibilities didn＇t end there with past winners Leonard McLaren，Peter Green and Peter Stuart expected to provide stern opposition，as well as a resurgent Bruce Watson．
One factor likely to have an impact was the relatively fast time control -45 moves in 90 minutes plus 15 minutes each to fimish
The carpeted venue provided ideal playing con－ ditions，and digital clocks were used on all boards，thanks to North Shore，Howick and Pap－ atoetoe clubs boosting Waitemata＇s stock of DGT＇s
The competition was run，as usual，in three separate grades，so all players were guaranteed a good quota of tough games

## Round One

The tournament began with an upset，with Paul Beach（1944）outplaying Garbett（2339）in a Sicilian．This was the only game to spoil a perfect swiss result

## Organisation and support

The tournament was once again a great success for the organising club，Waitemata．Director of Play Graham Banks did his usual smooth job， and there were no disputes．
The number of late entries（ten）did put pres－
sure on Graham and myself，as the organiser，but round one started only a little late．I am at a loss to know why so many people could not decide until the day that they would be playing，when entry forms were distributed at least six weeks in advance．
Welcome new visitors this year were Brian and Colleen Foster，of NZ Chess Supplies，who brought along an extensive display of wares．
The continuing support of the Waitakere Li－ censing Trust provided not only a brilliant chess playing venue，but a generous prize－fund．
And the tradition of free drinks and refresh－ ments for players and officials was continued after the prize－giving．

## Unregistered players

One matter of concern was the large number of unregistered players．
To fulfil NZCF regulations Waitemata had to register 23 players who are not members of our club－more than a quarter of the total entries． This seems to highlight a problem with the cur－ rent system ：clubs who do not nationally rate their internal tournaments do not seem to be registering their players，thereby handing over the responsibility of doing this to clubs who organise outside tournaments．This needs ad－ dressing，as I do not see why already busy club officials should do the work of other clubs．

## Obituary

## Zoltan Shardy

## B．Jaszkrajeno Hungary I／5／16 D．Wellington 10／4／200

Zoltan Shardy was undoubtedly one of the more colourful characters on the Wellington chess scene．He was a man whose full story was not well known by most chessplayers．A Hun－ garian Jew，his entire immediate family－brother， sister and parents－were killed by the Nazis．He survived by being fit enough to work in a Ger－ man labour corps．He made his way to New Zealand in 1960，but having trouble finding suitable employment spent periods working in Canada and the U．S．before returning to Wellington．Once back he invested in property and became a successful and wealthy property owner．
Zoltan found it hard to heal the wounds caused by the loss of his family and this seemed to manifest itself in his willingness to defend him－ self through the courts whenever he believed his rights were being threatened．He was well known in Wellington legal circles for taking court action against various individuals as well as the Inland Revenue Department，Wellington City Council and the Wellington Hospital Board．Zoltan had a very sharp mind，a fact not readily apparent when trying to understand him through his painfully thick Hungarian accent．He had trained
as an economist and he represented himself in court，gaining a number of victories．
His last and most famous court appearance occurred last September when he became the first individual to prepare a case and represent himself before the Privy Council in London．This was the climax of an ongoing property case battle Zoltan had been doggedly pursuing through the courts．He was undeterred despite losing every step of the way，including at the Privy Council．
In recent years Zoltan began making trips back to Hungary where he tried（unsuccessfully）to sue the Hungarian government for the loss of his parent＇s properties．This year he visited Bu－ dapest solely to have a new set of teeth installed． Zoltan＇s main recreational passion was chess． The impression he gave of never quite compre－ hending what was happening when Tournament Directors were giving instructions，led many to underestimate his skills over the board．Regu－ larly I would hear players complaining that by some injustice they had been beaten by Zoltan． He played for the Civic Club for many years and was a life member of the club．

2000 N．Z．Women＇s Championship

Waitemata Chess Club agreed to run this year＇s NZ Women＇s Championships at late notice after no other offers were forthcoming．
We duly arranged a good venue，a director of play and distributed entry forms to clubs and all known female players throughout the country well in advance．Given the effort put in the response was most disappointing．Just four women entered and questions were raised about whether the Championship should be held at all． In the event，the competition did go ahead，in the form of a double round robin．
Defending champion Viv Smith（1685）was the clear favourite to win her third title in a row．She was rated nearly 250 points higher than second seed Edith Otene（1426）．The other players were Helen Courtney（1319）and Amy Millano （1277），formerly Amy Cater．

Long way ahead
Viv Smith was clearly a deserving winner of her seventh New Zealand Women＇s Champi－ onship．She was a long way ahead of her rivals in this event in her understanding and play．It is a pity that some of our better female players－e．g． Teresa and Rosaleen Sheehan，Fenella Foster，

Katrine Metge－were not able to play and give her some serious competition．
Second place－getter Edith Otene made the most of her chances，but was almost as prone to serious errors as third place－getter Helen Court－ ney and tail－ender Amy Millano．Millano was clearly out of practice after a lengthy break from chess，while Courtney perhaps suffers from lack of regular club play．
Away from the board，Kelston Girls High School deserves mention for providing an excel－ lent venue that could have accommodated a much bigger field．
As Director of Play Bruce Pollard gave up three days of his time for a miserly payment，while Bob Smith put in a lot of work behind the scenes，including producing daily bulletins．
It should be mentioned that this is the third time in recent years that Waitemata has hosted the NZ Women＇s Championships；it could well be someone else＇s turn．

switches to the $f$ file and starts checking on $\mathrm{f4}, \mathrm{f}, \mathrm{f} 2$ and fl ．If the White king tries to ap－ proach the rook，it switches to the a file again． So Dive＇s 46．Nxf6！was good enough to reach a drawn rook endgame－it was only 58．Kf4？？ which threw the game away．

## Fist fight at the Doerberl Cup

The Annual Doeberl Cup in Canberra in April was won by IM Alex Wohl（he defeated Ian Rogers in round 6）half a point clear of GM Darryl Johansen and Mark Chapman．Rogers was a further half point behind．
The event achieved wider media coverage than might have been expected because of a fight that took place during round four．The incident oc－ curred when David Beaumont of Melbourne be－ came upset by the noisy comments made by another player，Sydney＇s Alexander Gaft，whose game had already concluded
Beaumont politely asked Gaft to keep quiet but Gaft replied with abuse followed by an invitation to step outside to settle the matter．Despite hav－ ing only a few minutes left on his chess clock to finish the game，Beaumont left his seat and moved towards Gaft．A violent brawl ensued， spilling over from the playing room to the corri－ dor，with Gaft being repeatedly
punched and Beaumont thrown onto a glass door．
The fight was broken up after a few minutes by other players，whereupon Beaumont retumed to his game．
＂Beaumont was sorely provoked，＂admitted chief arbiter Shaun Press，＂but retaliation is no excuse．＂＂We have had people thrown out of the tournament before but never for fighting，＂said

Press．
Despite having only 20 seconds left upon his return to his game from the fight，Beaumont succeeded in achieving a draw．However the organisers of the toumament immediately de－ cided to expel both players from the tournament． Press said that he expected Gaft to be banned from tournament play in Australia for a consid－ erable period．

## Overseas news

## Shanghai

The Sufe Cup toumament featured four women and two Burmese players in a category 13 event in March．Gms Mikhail Krasenkov （POL）and Ye Jiangchuan（CHN）left the field for dead in finishing tied for first place with $101 / 2 / 13$ ．Next were GMs Bologan（MDA）and Peng Xiaomin（CHN）on $81 / 2$ then GMs Filip－ pov（RUS）and Zhang Zhong（CHN） 8.
At the other end of the table were the two untitled Burmese players，both rated 2595. Aung Aung scored $31 / 2$ and Nay Oo Kyaw Tun 2．Such players（and Myanmar has a stack of them！）should be much in demand by organis－ ers of title norm events，even after FIDE＇s recent decision to dock 100 points off the rat－ ings of all Burmese players rated over 2100！

## Monte Carlo

The Amber tournament，ninth of the series sponsored by Dutch enthusiast Joop van Oost－ erom，featured the usual mix of rapid and blindfold play with a field of 12 stars which docs not change a great deal from year to year． With an average rating of 2684 the event would have been of category 18 had it been a normal chess tournament．
Vladimir Kramnik（three victories）and Vishy Anand（two victories）have been the most suc－ cessful players in the event，though Alexei Shirov did finish first equal with Kranmnik in 1998 and was joint runner－up（with Veselin Topalov）last year．This year Shirov，who these days plays under the Spanish flag，took the lead in the middle rounds and，despite losing $1 / 2-1 / 1 / 2$ to Vassily Ivanchuk in the final round，still finished $1 \frac{1}{2}$ points clear of his closest pursuers． That last round loss was his only one in 22 games！

## Reykjavik

Gary Kasparov defeated Vishy Anand 3－1 in the final of a rapid tournament in April．The twelve players were divided into two prelimi－ nary groups，each with three Icelandic Gms and three foreign GMs．In group 1 Kasparov（RUS） scored $41 / 2 / 5$ with Margeir Petursson following at a respectful distance on 3．Jan Timman （NLD）and Helgi Olafsson were next on $2^{1 / 2}$ ， then came Fridrik Olafsson $11 / 2$ and Viktor Ko－ rchnoi（SWI） 1 ．Group 2 was won by top seed Anand（IND）with 4 points and he was fol－ lowed by Aleksander Wojtkiewicz（POL）31／2， Ivan Sokolov（BIH）3，Hannes Stefansson $21 / 2$ ， Johann Hjartarson $11 / 2$ and Jon Arnason $1 / 2$ ．
The two favourites drew their first semi－final games and won their second to eliminate Wo－ jikiewicz and Petursson．In the final both rapid games were drawn and there followed a two－ game Blitz tic－breaker where Kasparov won both games．

## Bali

The Japfa Classic International at the Bali Beach Hotel，at category 16，was the strongest tournament ever in Asia．The top four finishers met in the final round，Judit Polgar defeating Gilberto Milos with the black pieces while world champion Alexander Khalifman pressed Anatoly Karpov but had to acquiesce in a draw to leave Polgar alone in the top slot．Burmese player Zaw Win Lay won his only game， against out－of－form Jaan Ehlvest，in the last round to gain a share of second to last．

Following the GM tournament there was a 230－player Open which was won on tie－break by GM Darmen Sadvakasov（KAZ）with $71 / 2$ ． On the same score were Gms Jaan Ehlvest （EST）and Normunds Miezis（LAT）plus IM Bong Villamayor（PHI）．Top seed was no other than Zaw Win Lay（MYA）who managed to play only one rated player in reaching 6 points and a placing in the thirties．

## Southend

The Redbus knockout toumament，played over Easter，featured 16 British players with a time control of 100 minutes plus 30 seconds per move．In the event of a 1－1 tie two 10－ minute games were played with a sudden death blitz decider if necessary．
Michael Adams and Bogdan Lalic beat Jonathan Rowson and Mark Hebden respec－ tively in the semi－finals，the last mentioned having eliminated Jonathan Speclman in the quarter－finals．In the final both normal games were drawn as were the pair of ten－minute games and in the sudden death fifth game Lalic
（white）blundered in a marginally worse end－ ing．

## Pula

The strong Zone 1.2 event in Croatia was an 11－round Swiss with 34 players of whom 21 were Gms and 9 were Ims．Seven World Cham ${ }^{-}$ pionship places were at stake
Alexander Belyavsky（SLO）was a clear win－ ner with 8 points while the Israeli trio of Lev Psakhis，Ilya Smirin and Emil Sutovsky fin－ ished equal second on 7 points．There were four players on $61 / 2$ with Emir Dizdarevic （BIH），Christopher Lutz（GER）and Ivan Zaja （CRO）qualifying while Nikola Mitkov（FRM） missed out due to his inferior tic－break score．

## Essen

An all－GM category 15 round－robin in April－May saw a three－way tie for first place between Klaus Bischoff（GER），Alexei Dreev （RUS）and Vadin Zvjaginsev（RUS）with 51／2／9． Rustem Dautov（GER）was next on 5 points and then came： 5 Belyavsky（SLO） $41 / 2 ; 6-9$ Curt Hansen（DEN），Hübner（GER），Milov （SWI）and Sutovsky（ISR）4； 10 Glek（RUS） 3.

## New York Open

Organiser Jose Cuchi was back in May after a year＇s break with perhaps the most famnous of the international opens．This year＇s event had 200 players in the top grade which was won by Israeli GM Ilya Smirin with $7 \frac{1}{2} / 9$ ．Four more GMs shared second place on 7 points：Nick De Firmian（USA），Alexander Goldin（ISR），Igor Khenkin（GER）and Alexander Ivanov（USA）． Gms took 28 of the top 30 places！

## World Championship

FIDE has accepted a plan which would see the first part of the 2000 World Championship played in New Delhi starting on 25th Novem－ ber．The remaining games would be played in Tehran（Iran）though Elista will be on standby in case an Israeli player is involved．
FIDE president Kirsan Iljumzhinov has agreed to underwrite the event to the tune of three million US dollars．Indian organiser P．T．Ummer Koya has raised some sponsorship but apparently is still looking for more．
