New Zealand Chess

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Dowden wins event to commemorate NZ chess stalwart, as told by Quentin Johnson.

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The 2003 North Island Championship and Rapid Championship were held in the pleasant surroundings of St Paul's Collegiate School, Hamilton, from the 14th to 19th of July. This has been the venue for most recent North Island Championship events and thanks must go to the school for their support of chess in the region. This is in no small part due to the efforts of St Paul's staff member and Hamilton Chess Club stalwart Gary Judkins, who has initiated considerable chess activity at the school. This year's Championship was a Global Chess Enterprises Class 2 event, and was also FIDE rated. The Hamilton Club was very pleased to obtain the participation of IM Gary Lane and his wife WIM Nancy Lane from Australia, who were taking a short NZ holiday to coincide with the event.

While top level 2200 plus NZ players who might have challenged Gary more seriously in the event were largely absent, there were still a number of surprises in store as has been the case in recent years. Top NZ seed was local player Graeme Spain, followed by Mark van der Hoorn, Antonio Krstev, last year's surprise winner Daniel Han and Ben Giles. Other players to watch who were aspiring to FIDE rating performances were locals William Lynn and Philip Rossiter, last year's NZ Junior Champion Jesse Wilson, fellow Wellingtonian Michael Nyberg, Brendan Reedy from Christchurch, and Auckland junior Gino Thornton. **Round One**

Most seeds proceeded on their way with wins although there were a few near upsets. Daniel Han was held to a draw by Caleb Wright of Tauranga, Graeme Spain was made to work hard for his win by junior Michael Zhang and Ben Giles had to come from behind to win against local junior Blair Robertson. Local juniors Glenn Parker and Richard Dare also scored minor upsets by drawing with their higher rated opponents Gino Thornton and Bruce Kay respectively.

Round Two

This round was very much according to seed-

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ings with IM Lane beating Wilson, Spain, van der Hoorn, and Krstev winning against Nyberg, Rossiter, and Reedy respectively. Ben Giles and Daniel Han drew a remarkable R+3 v R ending with tripled f pawns, in an ingenious defensive performance from Daniel.

Round Three

Gary Lane scored a relatively easy win over Antonio Krstev, as black lost first an exchange and then a whole piece in a French. The most interesting match up was the local derby Lynn v Spain, where Graeme overlooked a key defensive resource in time trouble to be beaten by a very determined William Lynn. Most other match ups were relatively one-sided, resulting in wins for the higher ranked player.

Round Four

Round 4 match ups saw Mark van der Hoorn playing the Vienna against Lane, and looking slightly surprised when someone pointed out that Gary had written that book as well! Mark tried to pull off a save with a sacrificial flurry, but missed the most challenging line in time trouble and lost. Giles and Lynn agreed a quick draw, while Spain's Morra Gambit was held to a draw by Reedy. Krstey defeated Rossiter. while Han was held to draw by David Xu, and Nyberg beat Charomova. At this stage Lane led with 4, Lynn 3.5, and van der Hoorn, Krstev, Giles, Wilson and Nyberg 3.

Round Five

The fifth round saw Lane win quickly against Lynn, Wilson score a surprise win over van der Hoorn, Krstev defeat Nyberg, Reedy beat Giles, and Spain's Scandinavian Defence overcome Han.

Round Six

In round 6 match-ups Spain defended stoutly against Lane but lost on time, Wilson continued his good form with a win over Krstev, Lynn was impressive in beating Reedy, van der Hoorn defeated Xu, Giles drew with Thornton, Nyberg defeated Gold, and Han drew with Charomova. This left the scores after round 6 as Lane 6, Wilson 5, Lynn 4.5, van der Hoorn, Krstev, and Nyberg 4. In a re-run of Daniel Han's

Round Seven

Lane continued on his way with a win over Nyberg, while the critical Board 2 game Wilson v Lynn ended quickly with a blunder by Lynn, leaving Jesse Wilson with at least a share of the NI title with a round to spare. Krstev lost to van der Hoorn, Spain had a nice win over the solid Caleb Wright, while Reedy, Giles and Han were also winners.

Round Eight

2003 New Zealand Junior Chess Championship

If this year's NZ Junior Championship is any indication of things to come, chess in New Zealand has an exciting future.

A record field of 60 players gathered at Green Bay High School in West Auckland on July 7. Some came from as far afield as Wellington, and even Christchurch.

They included most of the strongest junior players in the country.

Top seed and hot favourite with a rating of 2158 was Puchen Wang. Other well-performed juniors included Daniel Han (2025), Gino Thornton (1631), David Xu (1566) and Ev-guenia Charomova (1551).

There had also been talk from down south of the strength of two Christchurch brothers, Jeremy and Stephen Watson.

The players were not only competing for numerous NZ age group titles, but also more than \$2000 in prize-money, books, supplies and trophies.

The organising club, Waitemata, had been successful with a funding application to the Portage Licensing Trust, which made it possible to offer the biggest prize-fund in the history of the tournament. The club also donated a trophy – long overdue – which will be presented annually to the NZ Junior Champion.

Lest readers conclude the players came because of the prizes, I should note that entries came flooding in well before the increased prize-fund was announced.

These juniors were there for the enjoyment of chess, and for a stimulating contest against their peers.

Director of Play for most of the Championship was NZ Women's Champion Viv Smith, while husband Bob filled in on the final day. They had few problems to deal with, as there were no disputes.

Round One

Most of the top players had no problems. Perhaps the luckiest was Sue Maroroa. Her opponent Eachen Chen spurned a forced checkmate but still reached a winning position, queen against pawn on the seventh rank. Unfortunately Chen's knowledge didn't cover this position; Maroroa soon queened also and went on to win. Shirley Wu was not so lucky, losing to Brendan Dalton after mistakenly closing up the lines to her opponent's king.

Round Two

Another easy round for most of the favourites. Maroroa was again the exception, struggling to draw from a pawn down against Caleb Shaw. **Round Three**

The competition began to heat up. Michael Zhang was the first to suffer, having the misfortune to be paired with the promising Jason Wu. The country's top seven-year-old, Alex Pan, also had his first loss, to ten-year-old Jeremy Watson of Christchurch. Maroroa again managed to salvage half a point from a lost position, drawing from a pawn down against Hamilton's Richard Dare.

Round Seven

Wang took a quick draw against Zhang to ensure clear first. Xu fought on admirably against Akbar Ashrafi, converting his advantage in a rook endgame. Han was too steady for Darius Ashrafi. Thornton recovered from a bad opening to beat Shaw after the latter fell for a simple tactic. Jason Wu reached a superior position against Charomova, liquidated to a drawn ending, but then went horribly wrong, Maroroa saw the winning tactic the second time round against Natasha Fairley. Shirley Wu had her luck for the tournament when Matthew Chan help-mated from a piece up.

Conclusion:

Puchen Wang was clearly the strongest player and well-deserved to take out the NZ Junior Championship for 2003, Runner-up David Xu was also impressive, fighting hard in all his games and losing only to Wang. Han, Thornton, Zhang and Charomova shared third place. Han would have been hoping for more and could be regretting his quick draw against Thornton. Thornton was one of only two undefeated players, but was too ready to take draws against his rivals and also escaped some dubious positions. Charomova played hard throughout; her fighting spirit was rewarded in the final round when she won a crucial drawn ending against Wu. Zhang also put in a good effort; he can hardly be blamed for taking a quick draw against Wang in the last round, considering the latter's imperious performance. Apart from the major place-getters, the age

NZ Chess

This event held at Queen's Birthday weekend commemorated former Otago stalwart, Malcolm Foord who died last year. His widow. Mrs. Enid Foord spoke at the tournament opening. Her amusing anecdotes revealed Malcolm's genuine devotion to chess in New Zealand. Local identity, John Gibb also spoke eloquently, among other things recalling that Malcolm was the only Otago player to beat Chandler in a simultaneous exhibition in 1986. GM Murray Chandler, who recalled Malcolm's kindness during his first NZ Championship, generously sponsored the tournament, thus enabling it to become a Class 2 event in the GCE Grand Prix. A further drawing card was the prospect of achieving a FIDE rating block.

To enhance players' chances of achieving a FIDE rating block, the tournament was divided into two groups with 14 players contesting the Open tournament while 12 fought it out in the B tournament. The top two seeds were locals, NM Richard Sutton (2275) and NM Tony Dowden (2210). The organizers were grateful that FIDE-rated players: Hilton Bennett (Hamilton, 2064), Ben Giles (Maruia Junction, 2005) and Edith Otene (Auckland, 1998) were prepared to travel a considerable distance to the event, as without them FIDE blocks would have been impossible. The B tournament favourites were Alastair Newbould (OT). Bruce Gloistein (CA) and Hamish Gold (OT). However, a few pundits thought that reputations could take a battering when early pairings suggested that upsets could be in the offing.

Rd 1. Predictions about upsets were spot on when both top seeds lost! Chris Benson beat top seed. Sutton after the latter dropped a piece due a vulnerable back rank. Bennett was held to a draw by Craig Hall, while fourth seed Quentin Johnson scraped a draw against Geoff Aimers after losing a piece. Veteran Arie Niiman also lost to Brendan Reedy, though it is doubtful that the result of any game Arie is

As the only undefeated player. Tony Dowden was the deserved winner of the Malcolm Foord Memorial tournament. He enjoyed some good fortune but one still has to play well to take advantage of it (in this regard he says he is "inspired by the current NZ champion"). Of the two runners-up, Richard Sutton must have regretted his slow start but his sheer class meant that he came within a whisker of overall victory. Although Giles efficiently dispatched the rest of

his field, he came up short against the top seeds in what was still a good performance as joint runner-up. Reedy and Donaldson were two other players to perform well: Reedy played a strong field and would have taken the grade prize (awarded to Donaldson) had he not made the main prizelist. The North Islanders were not sighted in the prize list but their presence was greatly appreciated (better luck next time guys). Four players achieved FIDE rating 'blocks': Benson (rating performance of 2086), Reedy (2082), Watts (2050) and Craig Hall (1946). After his first round hiccup against Mulligan. Newbould bore out the good form of recent club results in Otago to dominate the B tournament. Mulligan performed well above his rating in coming second, while another to have a good tournament was ex-Wellingtonian, Clarry Webber who picked up the grade prize.

Overall, it was a highly memorable tournament. Thanks are due to: our principal sponsor, GM Murray Chandler; Oceania president, Gary Bekker for paying the FIDE fees; Global Chess Enterprises for sponsoring the Grand Prix: Mrs Enid Foord and John Gibb for agreeing to speak at the Opening Ceremony; Phil Hall for his fine job as arbiter and lastly, to the Tournament Committee for their efforts (Duncan Watts, Tony Dowden and Quentin Johnson).

Junior Chess

The 2003 Inter-schools Team Chess Championship is nearly at the end of its most successful year so far. This year we have had far greater coverage of NZ and it looks as though 2 new regions – Northland and Otago – may be added next year. The other notable feature of this event is that the standard of play is improving more and more each year, all of which is good news for NZ chess.

Auckland:

The only Auckland region that hadn't been run before the last magazine issue was South Auckland, which was run by Bob and Viv Smith. This region has unfortunately not had an intermediate division so far, but the Primary division was ably won by Papatoetoe Central this year.

This left 5 Primary and 4 Intermediate winning teams from North, South, Central, East and West Auckland competing for the Auckland title this term. The Auckland Championship was held at the Freemans' Bay Community Centre, due to the generosity of the Auckland Chess Association, who sponsored the event. With players like David Xu and Michael Zhang representing Bucklands Beach Intermediate this division had a clearcut winner right from the start. Second place went to Waikowhai Intermediate, with Belmont Intermediate coming 3rd. In the Primary division a few other well-known names appeared, such as Jason Wu and Alex Pan, making for some very mature chess games. This competition result was a little closer and was eventually won by last year's winners, St Heliers, with Konini Primary 2nd and Epsom Normal in 3rd place. In the secondary division a separate event was run in Auckland by Peter Stuart. There will be a report on the results of this in the next magazine issue.


Once again I ran the Manawatu Open Schoolpupils. When I first started I called the event the "Manawatu Secondary Schoolpupils" as it was confined to secondary students from the Manawatu. Then I changed it to the "Manawatu Open Secondary Schoolpupils" as I invited players from Wanganui and Wairarapa. The event has now evolved into an open event for all schoolpupils ie I sent invitations to the intermediate schools in Palmerston North.

There were 20 participants this year -a decrease because of the bad date I chose. Only one player turned up from Wanganui as they had a big event the next day and my own school (Palmerston North Boys') had senior exams. This never bothered me when I went to school but the members of my chess club are more studious!

The event was a 6 round Swiss – I put an extra round in from previous years because I was using the software supplied by NZ Chess. And what a difference it made! Pairings happened in the blink of an eye. Next year I will have 7

rounds and start later!

Courtney Thomson (Palmerston North Boys') won with 6/6. This was important for Courtney as he could not participate in our school championship due to singing commitments with our top choir. Courtney believes he should/would have been the club champion and the key game was his fourth round crushing win over Jingwen Chiu who has been Palmerston North Boys' champ for 3 years. Courtney won \$50 and Jing-wen came second (5/6), earning \$30. The new element this year was the 9 students from Palmerston North Intermediate Normal and one of them, a very determined Dylan Chen, came third (\$20) after a 4 way play-off with secondary students. Dylan also took away the prize (also \$20) for the top Intermediate player.



New Zealand News

Otago Spring Rapid Tournament by Quentin Johnson

Although slightly precociously named for a tournament held on August 30th, this class 3 Global Chess enterprises Grand Prix event attracted suitably fine weather and a healthy turnout of 15 players.

Of particular interest among the entries was that Dimitri Lazarev, a sixteen year-old from Omsk, Siberia with a FIDE rating of 2070. He was unfamiliar with the common English chess phrase "As every Russian schoolboy knows....' But his play showed that he had a commanding grasp of all the strategic advice usually appended to that sentence. By escaping from an inferior position (to a drawn opposite-coloured Bishop ending, of course) against top seed Tony Dowden, and clearly outclassing the rest of the field, Dimitri finished 1st equal with

Dowden on $4\frac{1}{2}$. Trevor Rowell with a good performance finished alone in 3^{rd} on $3^{1/2}$. Bob Clarkson's return to tournament chess was rewarded with the under 1500 grade prize on 3 points, while 2nd in the grade went to John van Zoomeren on $2\frac{1}{2}$.

The tournament saw the introduction of a scheme to encourage junior participation by subsidising their entry fees with a \$10 voucher awarded to the top three placegetters in the Otago/Southland junior championship held one week earlier. It was a step up in competition for all three, but they gained valuable experience at this level.

All Canterbury Chess Open

The format for both tournaments is a 6 round swiss with a time control of all moves in 90 minutes plus 30 seconds added per move from move 1.

The entry fee for the A Grade (FIDE rating event) is \$30 for a FIDE rated player and \$80 for a FIDE non-rated player. First prize is estimated at \$500 dependent on entries. The B Grade (the "old" All Canterbury tournament) entry fee is \$30. Prize fund is dependent on

Unfortunately for the other competitors, Gary was in no mood for compromise and carried on his winning ways from the previous five days to finish with 6 points. In rounds 2 through 6 he over-powered Gibbons, P. Green, Kulashko, Garbett, and Wang with a display of fine chess and excellent Rapid technique. His final margin of victory was 1.5 points. Second place was shared between four players, Garbett having drawn with Ben Giles in round 2, Kulashko and Smith drawing their final round game, and Giles coming through with a win over Nancy Lane in the final round. Other main contenders dropped off the pace, as Wang was beaten by Kulashko in round 3, and Green by Garbett in round 4. The under 1400 event was hotly contested

and finished in a four way tie for first with Robert Perelini, Vaughan Collingwood, Devon Smith, and local Alan Lin all on 5 points, closely followed by Temu Maroroa on 4.5. This grade event was a great success, and most players seemed enthusiastic about the concept.

Chess Endings Made Simple

by Ian Snape (Gambit)

If you feel you're lacking knowledge and understanding in the Endgame or if you'd like to improve the way you play this part of your game. then lan has written his book with you in mind. In the first part of the book he expertly shows "the areas of Endgames theory that are most relevant to practical success", and in the second half he charts 100 exercises, with answers, so that the reader can test his new knowledge on Endgame play. Throughout the theory part of the book Gambit has included several diagrams - which not only makes learning easier but means this section can be read without even having to set up a chess board! An excellent read in which you are sure to learn a lot. How to Use computers to Improve Your chess by Christian Kongsted (Gambit) Many chess players would like to know how best to use their computers to study the many different types of programs available, as well as using them as a 'sparring' partner. When Christian started to look for chess literature on this subject he found that there wasn't much around. so he has written this book to fill the gap. He endeavours to show players in a fair and unbiased way how to make the best use of their computers. Initially he covers the history of Computer Chess and then in Part 2 covers Improving with the Computer, in which their are some real gems, eg Computer-Assisted Analysis: Improving Your Opening Play; Improve Your Endgame Technique, and Playing Chess on the Internet as well as other examples. This is the book if you wish to get the best out of your computer for studing and/or playing chess. Gambit website can be found at www.gambitbooks.com

Emil Josef Diemer 1908 - 1990

by Alan Dommett (The Book Guild) Alan's well written book is first of all the story about Emil's philosophy on chess which was play for mate from move one. Alan shows through 126 of Emil's games, in which he uses his pet opening the Blackmar-Diemer gambit, how he played some of the very best attacking games around. Another bonus from this book is that through Emil's games, which Alan has done a fine job annotating and also showing in the index the BDG variations, that the reader can easily learn how to play this much under-rated opening. This hardcover book will appeal not only to readers who wish to know more about Emil Josef Diemer through his attacking games, but to players that are looking to learn and play the Blackmar-Diemer gambit opening. Grandmaster Secrets Openings

by Andrew Soltis (Thinkers' Press, Inc) Both these books follow the same approach which Andrew calls the 'Socratic teacher-student approach'. This teacher-student approach works well as the reader gets the impression through the conversational style of these books that the teacher is just talking to the student and covering the kind of questions that he would like to ask. The caricatures and quotes of many wellknown chess players are the real high point in Andrew's books, for example, "Always put the rook behind the pawn...Except when it is incorrect to do so" (Siegbert Tarrasch), and "Chess isn't a science" (Henri Poincare), All players will learn something when reading these educational and 'user-friendly' books, but I feel they are best suited to weaker players as the approach used in them will benefit them the most.

Fritz Technique Trainer

by Henrik Schlossner (Chessbase) This cd of Henrik's follows the same winning format of Chessbase's cd Fritz-Endgametrainer Pawn-Endings by Martin Weteschnik. Against the chess program Fritz you'll get to play 102 winnable game positions. However if you do get into trouble when they get harder, Henrik is there with explanations as to how to win. This cd also comes with the multimedia datebase 'Brains in Bahrain'. Other cds out by Chessbase are Boris Schipkov's Dutch Defence A90-A99 and The Isolated Queen's Pawn by Reinhold Ripperger. Brian Foster tells me he is now stocking Bad Bishop videos for hire at \$5.00 per video for 7 days. The Scheming Scandinavian with 2..Qxd5 by Andrew Martin was reviewed in a past review and the Tony Kosten video 'The Knockout Nimzo' has just become available on Bad Bishop's website. I hope to have more info on Bad Bishop videos in the next review. Four excellent chess books for juniors by NM Tony Dowden with Ben Dowden Many introductory books have been written on chess. Too often they lack any appeal for children and Dad has to teach the kids how to play. With the help of my son, Ben (7). I have found four books which offer a Father's Day guide for Dads looking for a painless way to teach chess to their kids. Like any book of genuine educational value, the secret to writing chess books for juniors is that kids (and Dad) will enjoy a book they can read and learn from without badgering Dad for help all the time. However my selection assumes Dads like to help every so often (and like to learn sneaky tips).

The first two books are for ambitious juniors who want to play winning chess. Picking on Dad might be one way but New Zealand's most accomplished player, Grandmaster Murray Chandler who now resides in England, has helpfully written two books which reveal some of the tricks which took him to the top when he was still a teenager. The other two books (both road-tested by Ben) are my picks for absolute beginners who have been given a lovely chess set from a distant uncle but can't find the instructions.

How to beat your Dad at chess Murray Chandler, GAMBIT (1998), hardback 127pp Dads should be immediately advised to hide this book at all costs! On the other hand Dad might learn something. While Ben can't quite beat this Dad (yet) he just loves playing the side of the 'good guys' and checkmating poor old Dad time after time. In the process of playing through fifty deadly checkmating themes he is learning a good deal about the power of tactics and the beauty of chess. This book is an ideal introduction to the idea of the double-attack which underpins most other types of tactics. **Highly recommended.**

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Chess tactics for kids Murray Chandler, GAMBIT (2003), hardback 128 pp This book appeared in this Dad's letterbox last week, still slightly warm after rolling off the press in August. The sequel to the 'Beat your Dad' book, 'Tactics' keeps to the same successful chapter formula with each new page turn revealing another chapter. Each of the 50 chapters illustrates a theme with six diagrams and four or five carefully graded examples. Ben does best with a chessboard and Dad's help but he can also learn a lot while curled up in his beanbag and looking at all those diagrams. Dads had better look out! This book really will increase the kids' chess strength. Dads would do well to try and keep ahead and sneak a look at the 54 test positions (and answers) at the end of the book. Highly recommended. Essential reading for serious juniors.

The Usborne complete book of chess Elizabeth Dalby (2002), hardback 96pp Far too many books for absolute beginners are done on the cheap. They might teach the moves, the rules and, if Dad is lucky, go through a game or two but that is it. This book costs slightly more than some others but it is definitely worth it. GM Jonathan Rowson has thoroughly earned his fee as expert consultant. The book is beautifully laid out with all sorts of captivating comments, tips and puzzles. It even offers several 'internet links' (they work but Dad might need to help).

Highly recommended.

Checkmate at chess city Piers Harper, WALKER (2000), softback or hardback 25pp Not a chess book as such but a book of mazes using a 'castles and dungeons' theme to teach and reinforce the moves of each chess piece. No need for Dad to lose any more hair trying to teach the kids how the pieces move. This could be an excellent gift for a favourite niece or nephew or for a long distance trip. But Ben made short work of it, so canny Dads might try to find an unmarked copy in a library. **Recommended.**

Correspondence Chess

Natasha Fairley - Sue Maroroa 2003 NZ Junior Champs

In this issue we feature C.C.'s longest and most prolific woman player, Glenys Mills of Waikanae.In her profile, Glenys modestly omits to mention one of her greatest triumphs. In 1988. following the successful Plaza International tournament in Wellington, where he came first equal, Russian Grandmaster Eduard Gufeld toured New Zealand giving simultaneous displays up and down the country. In a 10-board match at Kapiti, he won 9.5 - 0.5, with Glenys achieving fame by drawing with her illustrious opponent.

Here is the Glenys Mills story, as seen through her eves:

Many years ago one of our sons started me on chess. In our busy life, dinner was the only time available to play, so the chess set sat on the table and a game was played each night. After five years the time came to join a club. Two years into playing at the Tawa Club and I won my first game - Hallelujah! - it was a long time coming.

On moving up to Kapiti, I placed an ad in the local paper. Six people turned up at our home for evenings of chess. This group developed into the Kapiti Chess Club, where I served as club captain and secretary at various times. Nineteen years ago, an introduction to corry chess by the late Tom Powell led to a snail-like crawl up through the grades to Reserve, winning three grades en route.

1990 saw an unexpected drop to the Chess Olympiad in Yugoslavia as No. 4 in the women's team.

And now a wee bit about me. Mother of four. grandmother of six, my other interests are tramping, Scottish country dancing, gardening, landscape painting and looking forward to more corry chess.
