## 2004 South Island Championship

The Otago Chess Club played host to the 2004 South Island Championship and this year the tournament was held in four days over a weekend from Saturday 25 September to Tuesday 28 September, in a departure from the usual practice of five weekdays. Under the new FIDE time limit of 90 minutes plus 30 seconds per move, playing two games a day does not exert undue strain, and the scheduling of the event probably contributed to the higher than usual turnout of 25 players. In the absence of other sponsorship this meant the tournament was a class 2 event in the Global Chess Enterprises Grand Prix, with a total prize fund of $\$ 950$.
Standing out as favourites before the start were former NZ champion NM Richard Sutton, closely followed by the winner of the previous day's SI Rapid Championship, NM Tony Dowden, and NZ Championship regular Graeme Spain - on the hunt from Te Awamutu for more national master points. Beyond these three was a thicket of nine players in the 1800 2000 bracket who were all capable of a strong performance: Hilton Bennett from Hamilton, Ross Jackson and Alan Aldridge from Wellington, Bruce Donaldson, Craig Hall and Brendan Reedy from Canterbury, and locals Geoff Aimers, Duncan Watts and myself. The D.O.P. duties were shared between Phi Hall and Graham Haase, and as one of the organizing committee with Duncan and Hamish Gold, I was very glad to hand over to their capable management and sit down to my first round game:

The repeat of the top board pairing Benson Sutton from last year's Malcolm Foord Memorial (which resulted in an upset for Benson) provided some interest, especially as Chris looked as if he could even be ahead again. However a fine endgame N sac by Richard soon revealed the true nature of the position "The Master had his revenge," was Benson's comment after the game. The top half beat the
bottom half in all the other games except Muinder - Watts, where Canterbury junior Guy Mulinder played well and offered an early draw, catching Watts in a peaceful mood.

## Round 2

Sutton, Spain and Bennett each had whit against Hall, Aimers and Aldridge respectively and won to reach 2 points. Dowden gave the first sign that the imminent completion of his doctoral thesis might be having deleterious effect on his play in this tournament, by dropping a pawn against Jackson, but managing to draw. Reedy and Donaldson also dropped half a point - to each other. I faced the only other junior in the field (a disappointing turnout compared to the Rapid - and no female entries
either) Tim Riley of Invercargill, who had the bye in the first round. Against a totally unknown quantity I was careless in the opening and was very nearly punished - since it turns out that Tim has a 1900 ICC rating despite tak ing up chess less than a year ago! Lack of experience at this level and time limit told agains Tim in this tournament, but moving to Dunedin as a student at Otago next year, he will have ample opportunity to correct that. In a more pronounced battle of youth versus experience, Mulinder again played well against the wily Arie Nijman. But an error losing a vital tempo in the pawn ending turned what should have been a winning a-pawn vs h-pawn queening race into a losing one.

## Round 6

Spain's Scandinavian Defence sufficed for an early draw against Bennett to maintain at least a half point lead with just two rounds left. The game between the nearest chasers, Sutton Johnson, was a long and tense struggle of fluctuating fortunes. Finding myself a passed-pawn ahead in a Rook \& Knight ending, time pressure and my relative inexperience told and first I let the win slip then lost my Knight and the game. Alekine's famous quote about having to beat him three times: "In the Opening, the Middlegame and the Endgame," immediately sprang to mind. Dowden and Donaldson stayed in contention with wins over Aldridge and Aimers respectively, while Gold had a fine result against Jackson to lead the U1900 grade with Reedy, who beat veteran campaigner Bruce

Gloistein. Hall played an attacking NimzoIndian to defeat Watts at the start of a strong closing run..

## Round 7

Spain offered an early draw to Dowden in a French Tarrasch, knowing that his closest rival would have to face Tony in the last round. Dowden refused, but offered one of his own a few moves later. Meanwhile, Sutton was an exchange down and in trouble against
Donaldson's English Attack. But an imprecise Queen move by Bruce allowed strong counterplay, and then an unsound Queen sac was gratefully accepted by Richard to regain a share of the lead with one round to go. Bennett essayed his usual Budapest against me, this time choosing the Fajarowicz 3 ... Ne4 variation. For the pawn he obtained the two B's, a lead in development and reasonable attacking chances. But a premature push of his g-pawn allowed me to exchange some pieces and blunt the attack - the residual weaknesses in Hilton's kingside leading to further material loss. Reedy dragged Gold's King into a mating net to join Dowden and Johnson a point behind the leaders, while Hall's King's Gambit led to a mating finish against Nijman's Queenside castled King. Bruce Gloistein's mating attack crashed home against Aimers to guarantee at least $1^{\text {st }}$ equal in the U1600 grade.

## Round 8

Going into the final round five players had a theoretical chance of at least equal $1^{\text {st }}$ place. However, in reality $1^{\text {st }}$ would go to the one of either Sutton or Spain, both playing black, who achieved the better last-round result. On paper Sutton appeared to have the harder task against Dowden, but on form in this tournament Reedy could prove more difficult for Spain. As it tumed out, the latter prediction proved the more accurate with Richard making short work of Tony's Closed Sicilian, thus gaining the title of South Island Champion for the second time and at least a share of $1^{\text {st }}$ place. Meanwhile Brendan appeared to have the chances on board 2 .. Donaldson returned a favour from our last encounter by losing a pawn soon after finding himself in an unfamiliar opening variation. An exchange followed and eventually the game. Gold refused a draw to pursue an unsound attack against Hall, giving Craig his $3^{\text {rd }}$ win in a row and a likely share of some prize money. Bennett's Grand Prix Attack was unable to make headway against Jackson and eventually a draw was agreed. The second-to-last game to finish was Watts' determined win over Gloistein. This allowed Stephen Taylor, who traveled from Palmerston North, but was last member of the Ashburton club, to tie Gloistein for $1^{\text {st }}$ in the U1600 grade with his win over a fading Nijman.
By now Reedy's advantage over Spain had dwindled to $\mathrm{R}+2 \mathrm{Ps}$ vs $\mathrm{B}+\mathrm{N}+\mathrm{P}$ with none of the pawns passed: i.e. nothing. However, the determination and optimism that characterises Brendan's play was evident in playing on in a position that realistically only the side with the R could lose. Eventually hostilities were called off and I could start writing out the cheques!

1st place and 2004 South Island Champion was Richard Sutton on 7 points. Richard admitted he had taken some risks in the second half of the tournament, nearly coming unstuck in rounds 6 \& 7, and added that having five blacks had probably been helpful to him, "the player with white is more likely to try to do something." You can't score 7 wins out of 8 without taking risks and such a refreshing approach to winning titles is to be applauded. $2^{\text {nd }}$ place with 6½ was Graeme Spain, whose bag of 6 national master points will take him within striking distance of the title at the Wanganui Congress. It is hard to criticise Graeme for taking a safety-first approach in the last three rounds - remaining unbeaten after $5 / 5$ you would expect to be enough to win! $3^{\text {rd }}$ on 6 was a very pleasing result for me, as I haven't finished on the podium in a tournament of this kind for a very long time. $4^{\text {th }}$ was shared by Brendan Reedy and Craig Hall on $51 / 2$, who also shared the $1^{\text {st }}$ and $2^{\text {nd }}$ U1900 prizes. Both Players can be happy with this result - Craig, because from $21 / 2 / 5$ it was the best he could hope for, and Brendan because of the strong field he met, scoring $50 \%$ against five of the top six seeds Not allowing two prizes to be awarded to the same player required the creation of a $3^{\text {rd }}$ U1900 prize, which was much appreciated by Duncan Watts on $41 / 2$. Sharing the U1600 $1^{\text {st }}$ and $2^{\text {nd }}$ prizes was a just reward for the efforts of Bruce Gloistein and Stephen Taylor. Hard luck stories were those of Tony Dowden, whose brave decision to play despite being heavily preoccupied was only rewarded in the sense that the toumament was better for it. Bruce Donaldson's two losses on the final day marred what until then had been a good toumament for him, and he looks likely to break into the NZ Championship field soon. While Alan Aldridge realised on the last day that he had to leave to catch a plane two hours into the final round, and so was allocated the bye for that round, but unfortunately without the free point.
The event was covered in the Otago Daily Times, including a tribute on the final day in Tony Dowden's regular column to Arie Nijman, participat-

Tony Dowden Takes the 2004 South Island Rapid Championship by Quentin Johnson

This year the Rapid Championship was held at the Otago Chess Club as a 6 -round event on the Friday of 24 September, just before the Standard championship giving players the option of playing in either or both with the minimum of disruption to their work schedule. While the pretoumament registration system appeared to indicate a field as large as 31 , in the event a number of these entries were not realised. However the final field of 23 was still good, including a pleasing number of junior players (11) and girls (4), and ranked as a class 3 Global Chess Enterprises Grand Prix event.
The outstanding favourite was local NM Tony Dowden, who at 2252 was rated over 300 points ahead of the $2^{\text {nd }}$ seed Hilton Bennett of Hamilton. Other competition, if any, could be expected from Quentin Johnson, Alan Aldridge, Duncan Watts, and never to be dismissed lightly at this time limit, Hamish Gold.
Dowden duly dispatched his first four opponents including Watts and Bennett in round 3 and 4 to look set to coast home. Aldridge had dropped quickly from contention with a round 1 loss to dangerous Canterbury junior Guy Mulinder, while Johnson had let a win tum to a loss under time pressure at the hands of Gold in round 3. This was the second lucky escape for Gold, who had won from a Rook down against Mulinder in round 2, but his fluent and aggressive style lends itself to this kind of turnaround on many occasions.
In round 5 Gold held Dowden to a draw, leaving both in the lead on $4 \frac{1}{2}$. Half a point behind was Bennett, who had stopped Ashburton's Allan Mulligan strong run (he had just caused Aldridge's second loss), and Watts whose kingside attack against Johnson culminated in a thematic N sacrifice on g7. Next in the prize-hunt was Rex Scarf of Ashburton on $31 / 2$ ahead of a pack on 3 including Mulinder and South Island Junior champion, Leo Ding of Otago.
The final round saw Gold on top board with white against Bennett, while Dowden had white against Scarf. Dowden quickly won to secure at
least ${ }^{15}$ equal, but the top board game went right to the wire, with Bennett eventually getting home on the board just before his clock fell. Watts joined Bennett in $2^{\text {nd }}$ place on 5 points with a win over Aldridge. Gold was left alone in $4^{\text {th }}$ on $41 / 2$, while last round winners Johnson, Ding and Mulinder finished $5^{\text {lh }}=$ on 4 , a result which netted the two juniors the $1-2$ under 1600 grade prizes. In the unrated section, $1^{\text {st }}$ prize went to 11 year old Nabeelah Saib, whose 3 points represent great potential. Second equal was a very pleasing result for another local girl, 12 year old Ashleigh Brewer, along with the other Dowden in this tournament, 8 year old Ben, both acquitting themselves very well on $2 \frac{1}{2}$. The tournament was (perhaps unwisely since he also played, after a fashion) directed by Quentin Johnson with assistance from an elected disputes committee, and generally went very smoothly.

## Profile: Gordon Allen Hoskyn

About me:
I was bom in Wanganui on 6th July 1939, and have been married to Margaret for 35 years. My two biological children are Valerie, a teacher, and Gary, a chef. Apart from three years in Lower Hutt from 1958-60, I have always lived in Wanganui. I have been employed as a turner, clerk and storeman, and nowadays put pamphlets in letter boxes. T.V. likes: Movies, true stories and thrillers. Comedies, Dad's Army.
Reading likes: Newspapers and cricket books. I have played and enjoyed numerous sports, but my favorites have been harriers, indoor bowls, and of course, chess. All of which I have been both a competitor and an official

Over - the - board - chess:
I learned to play chess at $14 \frac{1}{2}$, and a few weeks later joined the Wanganui Chess Club after seeing an A.G.M. advert in the paper. (So it does pay to advertise.) Now 50 years later I am still a member
Club titles won are A-grade 1976, 1980, and 1982; A Reserve 1997 and 1998; and B grade 1957 and 1967. My favorite types of tournaments have always been Interclub matches and it is with regret that these are now largely a thing of the past. My record
is: played 60 , wins 28 , draws 19 , losses 13 , at 62.5 percent.
have taken part in Congresses and North Island Championships in Auckland, Wanganui, Upper Hutt, Wellington and Nelson with about a 50\% score. My best Congress was in 1994-95, finishing 4th equal in the Major Open. My best North Island Championship was in 1982, recording 5 wins including the scalps of Peter Goffin and Zig Frankel. After his event my rating peaked at 1868 - today it is 1764 .
n the NZ Masters Games I have won Gold, Silver and Bronze medals. I have played in 4 simuls with wins against Tony Boswell and

Ortvin Sarapu, and draws with Lev Aptekar and Murray Chandler.
On the administrative side, I have been Club President for the past 12 years, and before that I was Secretary-Treasurer for 13 years. I have been involved in publicity for about 30 years, and have contributed a weekly chess column to a local paper since 1991. I have helped organize about 300 tournaments.

Correspondence Chess:
I joined the NZCCA in 1972, and played until 1977, rejoined in 1990 and am still going strong. In Trophy Tourneys I have come first in TT3 twice, second in TT2, first in TT Reserve, and everywhere from second, to last in championship, but never first. First place also eludes me in the Handicap Tournament. In Certificate Toumaments I have had several firsts.
I have records of every move of every game that I have played in C.C. My statistics are: played 871 , wins 467 , draws 207 , losses 182 , and cancelled 15. I have played 212 different opponents for a plus score of 136 , an even score of 38 and a minus score of 38.
I like to play about 30 games at any given time, so that I receive regular mail. I try to play C.C. every day. When I first took up C.C I did not own a chess book; today I have about 60. I think I have always been stronger at C.C than O.T.B., and I enjoy making friends, some of whom I have never met.

New Zealand's dozen National Correspon dence Masters are: Bob Smith 43 Masters points, Michael Freeman 39.8, Paul Garbett 39.5, Michael Hampl 37.5, Peter Goffin 35.6, Peter Stuart 34, Bruce Barnard 33.5 Russell Dive and Murray Dunwoody 30.5, Tim Doyle 30.3, Maurice Heasman 30.1 and Roger Chapman 25.
To qualify for the Master title 25 points are needed, which can be earned as follows: One point for first place in the Reserve Championship; and in the Championship, one point for fifth, two for fourth, four for third, seven for second and eleven for first. Tied players share points. The Master title list is maintained and updated annually by Peter Stuart.

## ChessBase 9.0 (ChessBase)

It was originally my intention to write about some of the new products that have come out of ChessBase lately e.g. Queen's Gambit, Orthodox Defence and Alexander Bangiev: Squares Strategy, Vol. 1. However, just before this issue of NZ Chess, ChessBase released another of their premier programs, namely Chessbase 9 .0. Now, what's new in ChessBase 9.0 you may ask? Well there's a new database browser; hyperthreading support; integrated player index; tournament index; source index; annotator index and team index; new opening key layout; automatic opening reference; new HEUMAS (Heuristic Move Assistant); game history; fast real 3D; board supported; threat animation; improved search; Chess Media System (teaching videos with synchronized chess boards) integrated; improved correspondence chess features and many more. One of the features that I found very helpful is that, in the new ChessBase, the games can be printed out better, making them easier to read than with Chessbase 8.0 Exciting news! Garry Kasparov has recorded three DVDs for a new multimedia series: The Queen's Gambit, and How to play the Najdorf, part one and part two. Hopefully these should be out before the end of the year.

As most chess players know the Nardorf defence is one of the most popular and analyzed of all the defences that black can deploy. The authors of this book have not fallen into the trap that some writers do with books on the Najdorf, i.e recommending the trendy lines, as some are not sound nor practical for the club or tournament player. If you take what many consider the main line, 6 Bg 5 , the authors' choice is $7 . . \mathrm{Qc} 7$ which of course is the old main line, and against the classical line, 6 Be 2 , they recommended the move 6...e5! If you're interested in learning to play or to have the ideas of the Nardorf explained in an easy-to-read format, then this book is for you. There will be more on Gambit's books in the next column.

## 365 WAYS TO CHECKMATE

Yes, that's one puzzle for each day of the year, but be warned when you start trying to solve them they will become addictive! As readers who have read Joe's past books will know he writes in a very appealing style, and this book is no different. Being Joe's first chess book of puzzles he's provided many excellent exercises to train players in the 'knock out punch' in chess! You'll learn much starting from level 1 which can be done without a chessboard, right up to level 5 which will test even the strongest player. There are hints and tips for each puzzle if you do get into trouble solving them, so there's no getting lost. An enjoyable, constructive read on a subject that is not covered in a lot of chess books, but is a very important subject nonetheless.

## Chess (Monthly) Magazine

Sergei Soloviov concludes his report from last month on the Russian Championship, but what caught my attention was, at the end of the championship in a thematic blitz tournament, some of the participants decided to give the variation 1 e 4 c5 2 a3? a go You can read about this and a lot more in the November issue of Chess.

## New in Chess Magazine

As this is New in Chess Magazine's Anniversary Issue (2004/7) there are 24 extra pages featured, which makes it the size of a small book. On the cover of the magazine there is a picture of a dapper looking Garry Kasparov. Inside there's an extensive and lengthy inter-
view about his 20 years at the top of the chess world, with many other subjects e.g. family life, as well as the books he's authored. India held their first super-tournament which was won by Liviu-Dieter Nisipeanu. Emil Sutovsky's annotated game with Liviu is a great read, as right from the opening moves the game goes its own way. Here are some of the moves as a taster: 1.e4 d6 2.Nc3 e5 3.f4! exf4 4.Bc4 Qh4+ 5.Kf1 Be6 6.Qe2! The legendry Grandmaster Jan Timman reports and annotates the opening games of Kramnik-Leko's long awaited battle for the classical world championship.

Daniel King's new book and ChessMaster will be reviewed in the next column but, in the meantime, first time author John Cox dropped me a line about his upcoming book which is called Starting Out: Alekhine's Defence (Everyman). "The book is primarily intended as a guide for players rated 120-160 or so BCF (I think that's 1400-1800 ELO or thereabouts, but don't quote me): its aim is to give them enough theory to make sure they can get out of the opening with confidence, and enough knowledge of the basic ideas so that when they do get out the opening they will have a reasonable idea of what they're trying to do after that. Naturally though I hope it will have something to offer to stronger players as well, in the mould of Joe Gallagher's King's Indian and Caro-Kann books in the same series: although of course I don't bring Joe's grandmaster expertise to the task I tried to make up in diligence what I lack in ELO points (I am about 2320 strength, although I was stronger as a teenager before taking a 15 -year break from the game). In essence it is a Black repertoire book, although it does cover all Black's major systems against the Main Line, Exchange and Four Pawns. I concentrated particularly on the lines which are fashionable at the moment - the so-called Voronezh line in the ...cxd6 Exchange system (which I do not believe is half so formidable as its reputation), the $\mathrm{Bd} 3 / \mathrm{Nge} 2$ system in the ...exd6 Exchange recommended in a couple of repertoire books recently, and the newly invented 4...dxe5 5 Nxe 5 c6 line which is caus-
ing something of a revival for the Alekhine at high levels at the moment. I also give - I hope better coverage of 4 Nf3 Ne 6 than most books: interestingly the generally accepted refutation of this - $5 \mathrm{c} 4 \mathrm{Nb6} 6$ e6!?, has brought White a below-average score in the 70 or so years since it was first played. But at the same time I hope the book provides decent remedies against al White's tries, including some original ideas against lines like $3 \mathrm{Nc} 3 \mathrm{Nxc} 34 \mathrm{bxc} 3,3 \mathrm{~d} 4 \mathrm{~d} 64$ Bc4 and 3 d 4 d 64 f 4 , all of which can be dangerous to the unprepared. I am not a professional writer - this is my first and probably last
chess book. I found it a very interesting experience writing it, but my limited chess study time is best used elsewhere if I want to improve. If the reader finds it half so interesting reading the book as I did writing it then his money won't be wasted. Puffery aside, before writing the book I was convinced 1 ...Nf6 was inferior. I am now coninced it is as sound as any reply to 1 e4"
