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

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North Island Championship - Hamilton 2005

This year's North Island Championship and Rapid Championship were organised by the Hamilton Chess Club at Saint Paul's Collegiate School in Hamilton. The club is once again extremely grateful to St Paul's for making its excellent facilities available for this NZCF Grand Prix Class 1 event. The field of 32 players was similar in number and strength to other North Island Championships in recent years. The event was also FIDE rated with 11 FIDE rated players in the field.

The pre-tournament favourite was clearly long time NZ representative Bob Smith of Auckland, although it was expected that he would meet a stiff challenge from fellow Olympiad team member and top junior Puchen Wang. Graeme Spain of Te Awamutu and Nic Croad of Wellington were also expected to provide perform strongly. Several of the other junior players were also coming off strong performances in the National Junior event held the week previously in Wellington, with particular attention being focused on Daniel Baider, Eachen Chen, Gino Thornton, and Michael Wu. The field also had something of an international flavour with the presence of Costa Rican Women's Olympiad player Veronica Garcia Castro who is currently in NZ for a year on an international exchange scholarship. and Pengli (John) Zhang who has played junior chess at a regional level in China. The first round went according to seeding with wins to the top players, although 14th seed Dan Dolejs of Nelson broke the pattern by drawing with 30th seed Oscar Lynn of Hamilton. Results in round 2 again went according to seeding with the only minor upset being the loss by 5th seed Bruce Donaldson to Alan Aldridge. In the 3rd round Bob Smith drew with Gino Thornton in a very unbalanced game and Graeme Spain was held to a draw by Alan Aldridge. John Zhang missed the opportunity to claim a draw by threefold repetition in his game with Puchen Wang and critically went on to lose, although it was clear that he was going to be a force to be reckoned with. The

other result of interest was the defeat of the experienced Peter Fraemohs of Canterbury by in form junior Michael Wu.

The 4th round saw Puchen become the only player on 4 with a key win over Nic Croad. while Bob Smith moved to 3.5 with a win over Alan Aldridge. Gino Thornton continued to perform well drawing with Spain, while rapidly improving junior Daniel Baider upset Paul Spiller in a very sharp Bird's Opening. Local player Campbell Clark returning from a long absence from chess also surprised by drawing with Bruce Donaldson. Round 5 saw Smith and Wang drawing on top board, Croad beating Thornton, and Zhang drawing with Spain. This left Wang with 4.5 half a point clear of Smith and Croad. Round 6 saw two key decisive results with Wang defeating Spain, and Croad defeating Smith. Daniel Baider continued his fine performance with a win over Donaldson, while Zhang stayed in touch with a win over Rossiter.

The penultimate round saw Wang draw with Baider to move to 6 points while Croad moved level by beating Zhang. Smith and Thornton recorded wins against Wright and Fraemohs respectively to move to 5 along with Baider. The key last round match ups saw Wang playing Thornton, while Croad played Spain. After Croad lost to Spain, Puchen settled for the half point to leave him clear first on 6.5. Croad remained on 6 points for clear 2nd place, while Baider held Smith to a draw, and Zhang beat Donaldson which allowed Smith, Spain, Baider, Zhang, and Thornton to finish $3^{rd} = on 5.5.$

Apart from Puchen's very smooth and controlled performance to win the North Island Championship, the other impressive performances were probably those of the other juniors. Daniel Baider in particular continued recent good form, Michael Wu scored 5 points, and Eachen Chen and Richard Dare were 1^{st} = in Grade 2. Six players in all achieved FIDE rating blocks (Zhang, Baider, Aldridge, Rossiter, Doleis, and Wu).

players with 8 over 2000 ranking at the head of the field, and was a Grand Prix Class 1 event. Although Puchen Wang was unable to play, his absence was more than compensated for by Stephen Lukey, Peter Green, Leonard McLaren, not e4 or d4, is it more exciting to have chess and Matthew McNabb. The pace throughout the event was set by Stephen Lukey, with Green and McNabb in hot pursuit until they lost to Lukey in rounds 4 and 5 respectively to both finish on 5/6. Lukey completed his clean sweep by beating the again impressive Pengli Zhang in the final round to finish on 6/6. Other likely contenders dropped back as they conceded points to lower rated players along the way (Smith draw with Chibamba and loss to Fraemohs, Croad draw with Fraehmohs and loss to Zhang, McLaren draw with Marko, and Thornton draw with Robertson). Smith, McLaren, Croad, and Zhang finished 4th= on 4.5 points.

Grade One under 1900 was shared by Hamish Gold and William Lynn with 4 points. Grade Two under 1600 was shared by four players on 4 points (Blair Robertson, Jay Huang, Gerald Shields, and Jacques Lei). Grade Three under 1400 was won by another good performance from Eachen Chen with 4 points, while local junior Alan Lin was 2nd on 3.5. Grade Four under 1100 saw Judy Gao 1st with 3.5, with Oscar Lynn, Lillian Dare, and Robert Torrance 2^{nd} = on 3 points.

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"Chess For Girls Week 2005" 12 to 18 June

As part of this year's "Chess for Girls Week" girls championships were held in Auckland, Christchurch and Dunedin.

One hundred and eleven girls aged from 5 to 18 took part in the Auckland event, run by Waitemata Chess Club at the Mt Albert War Memorial Hall. We followed the same format as the previous 3 years - a 6 round swiss with 20 minutes each on the clock. Players were divided into three groups: the open section (over 12 years of age), under 12, and under 10 age groups. Chess clocks were used on the top six boards of each group. Clocks were also put on games where urgent results were required to complete the round.

Sixteen girls played in the under 10 division, which was won by 9 year old Jiaying Zhou with 6 straight wins. Eight year old Jiapeng Li was second on 5 points. This was no surprise to me as I'd already seen both of these girls out there playing in the Latvian, St Paul Junior Rapid, and Waitakere tournaments earlier this year. This experience would tell against the rest of the group.

The largest group was the under 12 section with 54 players. Sharon Wu was one of the main favourites to win this group. She had won the Under 10s two years in a row and the Under 12s last year. However we knew it was not going to be easy with last year's under 10 winner, Judy Gao in the field. Judy had notched up considerable tournament experience recently, representing New Zealand in the World Youth Festival in Greece last year, and playing in the Oceania Women's Zonal this year. The shootout came in the final round which Judy won, making her clear winner with 6 points. Sharon came 2nd equal along with her trusty Waitemata sidekick Clara Portougal (Clara always seems to be hanging in there in 2nd place) and newcomer Tung Ka Wong on 5 points.

But it was in the Over 12 division that we expected the competition to be the fiercest. The line up of 41 girls included double Olympiad players Evguenia Charomova and Sue Maroroa; World Youth representatives Shirley Wu and

Serra Tang plus rapidly improving and experienced club players Eachen Chen and Cecily Liu. It was also interesting to see how Hayley Johnson from Hastings would fare in this group. Given the rapid time control anything could happen.

All these girls made it safely through the first two rounds except for Hayley who lost to Serra in round 2. In round 3 Cecily lost her game to Evguenia while the rest continued on course. Round 4 was crunch time. Evguenia lost to Sue, and Eachen lost to Shirley. Serra and Cecily drew. Round 5 was the decider with Sue winning her game against Shirley. Lorraine Hamilton, a familiar face from previous championships, did well to beat Serra, and Hayley lost to Eachen. Round 6 was plain sailing for these girls apart from Eachen and Cecily who were drawn against each other. Eachen won that encounter. The final results were Sue Maroroa first with 6 points, and Shirley Wu, Eachen Chen, and Evguenia Charomova 2nd equal on 5 points. Serra Tang came 5^{th} on 4.5.

Everything ran very smoothly and efficiently thanks to our DOP Bob Smith, and invaluable help from Felicity Timings, Ewen Green, Victor Wang, Temu Maroroa and Brett Rider. It is no mean feat to run three tournaments, with 6 rounds, for 111 players and wrap up before 2.30 pm so the kids can get back to school. All winners and runners-up in each age group received trophies and every player received a participation certificate. These were delivered to schools after the tournament.

It's so great to see all the familiar faces of girls who have been coming regularly to this tournament each year, and it's also fantastic to see lots of newcomers playing in their first ever tournament and really enjoying the experience. One thing is certain - the standard and numbers of female chess players are growing steadily. This is especially noticeable in those regions where Girls' Week tournaments are held. But we need more regions throughout NZ to experience this growth. Please join us with a 2006 Girls Week Tournament in your region next year!

Chess for Girls Week 'over twelve' section in play

The decision to reschedule the traditional Otago Easter Tournament to Queen's Birthday weekend this year was vindicated, despite the proximity to mid-year exams discouraging participation by any tertiary students. The healthy field of 22 included a strong turnout from the Wellington, Canterbury and Ashburton clubs for this Class 3 Global Chess Enterprises Grand Prix event, with a total prize fund just short of \$600.

Clear favourite was New Zealand Championship regular, Nic Croad, with the only other 2000+ rated players being fellow Wellingtonian Michael Turner and local Quentin Johnson. However, a solid bunch of players in the 1800-1900 range lurked just behind these three.

The only upset was caused by 4th seed Duncan Watts dropping off the pace when he handed a powerful attack to Ashburton's Allan Mulligan. Mulligan won material and converted it to take the full point. Player Profile: Bob Mitchell

Bob writes:

Bio Details: I was born in Wellington NZ in 1941. My family moved to Christchurch in 1948 and I attended Hornby Primary and Christchurch West High Schools. My wife and I have been married 38 years and we have two daughters, both currently living in London. One is a teacher, and the other a lawyer with the London SFO. I completed a postretirement business degree in information systems and now am self-employed as a computer forensic analyst. Visit my web site at www. eforenzix.co.nz

Although I learned the moves as a child, chess didn't interest me until 1973. At that time I was seconded to Niue as Chief Officer of Police. The local Airport Superintendent, Bernie McAuliffe, was a keen chess player. I quickly became fascinated by the logic of the game. and the subtle beauty of its infinite combinations.

I bought my first chess book, MCO11, in an effort to break the cycle of regular drubbings and eventually managed to beat Bernie in a prepared variation of his favourite line. On returning to New Zealand I joined a chess Club at Johnsonville in 1976 and later moved to Tawa Chess Club whose members included the brothers Greg and Alan Aldridge, Max Wigbout, Don Stracy and a schoolboy named Russell Dive.

In 1977 I was promoted to Inspector and was national SAR Coordinator at Police HO. My job took me all over the country, so correspondence chess seemed like a good idea. I began playing in TT3Red in 1978-79, and astonished myself by finishing first =. Though never a strong player, I found that long hours of analysis helped me to play a reasonable game, and of course my chess library began to grow. Today I have a library of more than 260 books including many classics. In 1982-83 I won the Reserve Championship and was promoted to Championship grade.

I became interested and involved in chess ad-

ministration in the late 70's first at Tawa Chess club and then as a member of the Wellington Chess League. When the then NZ Chess Association moved to Wellington, I became Secretary. The next few years were busy as the Chess Association strove to gain recognition of chess as a sport. We eventually succeeded and won a grant of \$10,000 from the Ministry of Recreation & Sport to publish a book 'Wisdom in Chess' by Lev Aptekar. The book was distributed free of charge to every secondary and intermediate school in New Zealand to serve as a teaching syllabus for anyone wishing to learn or teach chess. I also did a mercifully short stint as Editor of NZ Chess during 1986 when Zyg Frankel's health forced him to stand down. As a result I have great admiration for anyone who has taken on this role. Tawa Chess Club owned an ancient Gestetner machine which came in very handy for publishing early editions of EP. Sandy Maxwell, Brett Sinclair and I spent many a Sunday afternoon turning the handle and sorting through piles of printed pages to make sure that EP got out on time. In 1987 I was promoted to Superintendent, and shortly afterwards transferred to North Shore Police District. My duties as District Commander precluded any involvement in chess either as an administrator or an OTB player, so aside from some overseas play, it was not until well after my retirement in 1999 that I was able come back to the game. I resumed OTB play at Congress in 2003 and

also resumed the role of Secretary of NZCF after a break of 15 years! 2003 also saw me as joint Seniors' OTB Champion with Victor Portougal after a last round upset robbed him of sole first place. My Championship correspondence play in 2004 yielded very modest results, but I look forward to improving during the 2005-6 playing season.


During my 'corry' career, I have played in 3 PATT tournaments, and in several Teams matches against BCCA. In one match I was drawn against my namesake, Bob Mitchell.

He was a retired British MP for Southampton. In 1983 I won a Best Game prize for a game against Jon Jackson I have included a few of my other wins as well

My chess nowadays is not of a high standard, but I still draw great satisfaction from playing. 

Player profile - K William Lynn

William Lynn was born at Herne Bay, Auckland, on 1 October, 1944. He learned to play chess at 10, playing with his three older brothers. Thus he has been a chess-player for 50 years. William attended Hastings Boys' High School, where he was senior chess champion 1960-61-62.

Married, with two children, William has just retired and has started up as a chess consultant and coach.

Previous sports he has played are athletics, bridge and hockey. Memorable is winning the open handicap section of the West Coast marathon (42.2k) in 1972, in 3 hours 12 minutes 8 seconds.

Chess club memberships include Rotorua (president) 1964-65; Nelson (secretarytreasurer) 1966-77; and Hamilton (president, secretary-treasurer and director of play) 1979-2005. His favourite type of event is the national Congress. He played in each from 1965 to 1974, and periodically since, including the last three in a row.

In his hey-day, William was a feared, attacking player and has specialised in the Blackmar-Diemar gambit for 37 years. He has collected many worthy scalps.

Titles won by William include the North Island Championship 1970, the South Island Championship 1974, and South Pacific Masters Games Gold medals in 2000 and 2002. William has beaten two grandmasters in

Starting out: the Dutch defence

No doubt now that Garry's retired there will be more and more books documenting his life and games. However, at the moment it's hard to go past this one as the author has produced an exceptional book - with the promise of another volume to follow.
